

BAIN DISCOVERS INELIGIBILITY FOR MAYORAL RACE

There's still plenty of time for another candidate to run.

Ron Bain, chairman of the Denver Libertarian Party, belatedly discovered – after mailing out 20 news releases formally announcing his candidacy for mayor of Denver – that he had not lived in Denver long enough to fulfill residency requirements spelled out in the Denver Municipal Charter.

"It's too bad, because the strategy was working", Bain commented. "The Colorado Statesman, KBCO, and the Rocky Mountain News had all picked up on the story, and Up the Creek was preparing to do a story when I got the bad news from [Denver Election Commissioner] Doug

Speakers Set for Convention

Both announced candidates for the Libertarian Party's 1992 presidential nomination have now confirmed that they will attend the CLP's annual convention in March. They join Don Ernsberger, cofounder of the Society for Individual Liberty and currently Assistant to the Chair of the national LP, in the speaker lineup for the gathering in Evergreen.

do a story when I got the bad news from [Denver Election Commissioner] Doug Anderson."

Bain instead plans to get involved in a project to ease ballot access requirements for state-level third party candidates. Trying to change Denver's charter and its residency requirements would be prohibitively difficult, Bain said.

Rather, Bain hopes to persuade newly sworn-in Attorney General Gale Norton to review a 1984 lawsuit filed by the Colorado Libertarian Party. According to Bain, the suit resulted in a ruling which stated that requiring third parties to get 10 percent of the vote before they can have automatic ballot access was arbitrary and capricious, but Secretary of State Natalie Meyer appealed the favorable ruling, and without having the prior decision overturned, managed to have it only selectively implemented.

Bain believes that, armed with an opinion from the Attorney General that agrees with the original court ruling, along with the ruling itself, the CLP can persuade the state legislature to ease ballot access prior to the 1992 general election.

Anyone interested in discussing or working on this project, particularly anyone with legal expertise, is encouraged to attend the next meeting of the CLP Board of Directors, scheduled for Saturday 9 February at 2 pm in the CLP

Jefferson County Chapter Laying Foundations for Growth

The newly formed Jefferson County Libertarian Party has begun planning of activities intended to promote growth in membership and political action. At its first business meeting, held 16 January in Lakewood, a half dozen activists settled on three projects for immediate action.

First, each activist will work to contact people from our mailing list who live in his or her own neighborhood, to encourage them to become more involved with the LP. Those who are not yet dues-paying members will be asked to join; others will be invited to take part in LP events, help distribute the CLiPboard, put a bumper sticker on their cars, or get involved in other ways, according to their interests.

Second, they will work to set up a campaign organization for county chair Thane Eichenauer, who is running for City Council in Lakewood. This will help activists gain experience with local elections, and provide an opportunity for new members to get involved in political activity right away instead of waiting for a general election.

Third, they will prepare for future recruiting and campaign activity by analysing the precinct-by-precint election results of last November's election. Vote counts for races in which Libertarians were candidates, and for ballot measures that may indicate libertarian sentiment, are being entered into a computer so that

Justice in Lakewood

Recently I was denied counsel, was put into a motion hearing without prior notice, rushed to justice, not read my rights, put in jail, denied bedding, denied adequate clothing, denied heat, denied doctor prescribed items in factory sealed containers my doctor supplied, denied material to file paperwork in my own behalf, my next friend filed a writ but the court would not look at a writ of habeas corpus until I was booked, and I was not considered booked until I signed papers that they would not let me have counsel for before I signed. I was denied all religious paperback books supplied by my next friend. Denied toilet paper. Denied seeing the judge until I was booked; but, they let me the next day. Sent to the emergency ward against my will and over my objection and kept until I finally submitted to taking drugs. Picked up on a warrant for failure to appear even though my next friend filed paperwork stating I had gone to see a doctor for my condition.

Why did this happen? Because a set of nunchukus (that did not even belong to me and that I did not even know were there) were found in a waste basket in the far corner of a storage room full of boxes in the privacy of my own house.

I was told (by an agent of the court) that if I appealed the case, that I did not have to show up at the sentencing. I appealed, served a copy to the City and now I have heard rumor that they have issued another warrant for failure to appear. When does it end? If not with me, with

you? your children? their children? who?

I have never had anything worse than a speeding ticket before, I do not use drugs, alcohol, tobacco, or sugar. I have taught martial arts for about 17 years.

I am looking for other people who have had problems with Lakewood or Jefferson County jail.

I am appealing. Any attorneys out there want a good case?

precincts can be compared and sorted. Data entered so far indicates that the percentage support for gubernatorial candidate David Aitken varied widely, ranging as high as 9%. (At the other end, there was actually one precinct where he got no votes at all. Countywide he received 2.16%.

DLP Decries Campaign Finance Reform Proposal

A contingent of about half a dozen members of the Denver Libertarian Party, including Ron Bain, Doug Anderson, David Aitken, David Bryant, and Mike Zink, dominated the discussion at the 3 January public forum on the city proposal to "reform" municipal campaigns with tax-paid financing.

However, the media reported only the comments of David Bryant, who was quoted in the next day's edition of *The Denver Post*.

Two different proposals, one put forth by Mayor Federico Peña and the other offered by Colorado Common Cause, each proposed limiting donations and capping total campaign expenditures. The Common Cause proposal also favored implementation of tax-paid campaign financing, including definitions of "frivolous candidates" who would not be allowed to participate in the tax windfall.

Mayor Peña has since been forced to back off his proposal after being informed that Supreme Court rulings establish the precedent that campaign limits without tax financing are unconstitutional (what country's constitution have they been reading, anyway?).

Denver LP Chairman Ron Bain, delivering the first and only speech of his abortive mayoral campaign, gave the Denver City Council members present at the forum the following answer to the question "Should tax paid financing of

for the situation we are faced with. Rather than educating themselves on the issues, voters generally cast "gut reaction" votes based on a candidate's looks or how many times they've heard his name on TV. Faced with the knowledge that most incumbents do not deserve re-election, the voters nonetheless consistently vote to retain incumbents.

Which brings me to my major point: Incumbency is the problem, not the amounts of money raised during municipal, or for that matter, federal, campaigns. Entrenched incumbents raise huge amounts of money in order to remain entrenched, and their challengers are forced to raise large amounts to dislodge them. Eliminate incumbency by limiting municipal office holders to one, or at most two, terms in office, and you'll see smaller amounts of money being spent on elections. Mayor Peña did the right thing by stepping down after two terms in office -how many members of the Denver City Council are willing to limit themselves to two terms?

Denver City Council members present at the forum the following answer to the question "Should tax-paid financing of municipal elections be implemented in Denver?":

My answer would be an adamant "No!", for several reasons, primary of which is the fact that Libertarians oppose tax subsidies for legitimate businesses, let alone tax subsidies for the often illegitimate activities of politicians. The federal government may subsidize presidential elections with a semblance of voluntary choice for the taxpayers by using an optional check-off on income tax forms, but I've not heard of the Denver City Council considering a voluntary or optional tax to subsidize elections. Besides, the federal government, with its deficits and corruption, is hardly the role model for Denver to emulate.

Greater voter participation at the grass roots level might help keep the municipal election system honest, but forcing people to participate in the fundraising process will only decrease participation at the polls to even more miserable levels.

More than 200 years ago, provisions were made in the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution to keep all levels of American government honest and free from corruption, and those provisions were freedom of the press and freedom of speech. Broadcasters and publishers in this nation are the only private enterprise singled out in the Constitution to have privileges that, in effect, make them an unofficial fourth branch of government, the so-called Fourth Estate, charged with acting as a watchdog to prevent government tyranny and corruption. The media are supposed to be the check-and-balance system to prevent the need for reform, but over the years the media have become the most strident voices in favor of collecting tax money to reform this problem or that problem, when education and an end to ignorance are the real solutions to the problems. Locally, statewide and nationally, the media have ignored their responsibility to uncover and report the excesses of government and politicians.
