Outreach at Oktoberfests

ith October comes Oktoberfest, and this year has brought two!

We had great success in Cupertino on Oct. 9-10, and as of press time, we're looking forward to Campbell's version of this traditional German celebration on Oct. 15-16.

The separate presence of the Libertarian Party, pitching LP candidates, and Lawful Gov, with the World's Smallest Political Quiz, helped us to project much more effective communication than usual.

We gave out 100-150 "Vision for America" brochures, as well as Gray for U.S. Senate and Badnarik for President material. Our "Bush/Kerry" flip coins were a hot giveaway.

The booth served as a rally point for many Libertarians. Saturday, June Genis from San Mateo County worked a big chunk of the afternoon shift. Steve Schoch from Santa Cruz came to pick up Judge Gray material. I was able to reach Judge Gray by phone so he could thank Nick personally.

Many other Libertarians stopped by and were also invited to the Oct. 14 Central Committee meeting.

Zander Collier made a contact with a person serving on the board of COMPAC, the group that organized the recent Barbecue.

Zander, Anne, and Brian did an awesome

job on Sunday getting out literature and hawking Libertarianism. It made a huge difference and highlighted the need for "front-room" personnel to meet and greet the public, and "back-room" folks who do the legwork to get to an event and back.

The booth again was fully manned. I was able to step away for a good portion of Saturday, and never worried about the booth's coverage.

Finally, Allen Hacker made a huge contribution with his sponsoring of the "World's Smallest Ouiz" booth. It did as much to inform others of Libertarianism, if not more, as our booth could, in a very engaging manner. Those who would give us a cursory glance would walk down the path and spend time with Allen.

While we did not register many new Libertarian voters or sign up new members, we found that booths at fairs are a very inexpensive way to reach the public. It's a great chance for the public to come to us, rather than for us to make the effort to find them. The amount of work and time it would have taken to walk the precincts to meet the same number of people is one or two orders of magnitude higher. The amount of traffic we receive for the price we pay is a substantial value proposition.

Perhaps my favorite observation: we were the only political party present! That sure felt good. I look forward to more such wins at the Campbell Oktoberfest.

The Home Stretch for Candidates

The LP's crop of energetic candidates are raring to go for the home stretch in 2004's momentous election.

Michael Badnarik (President) faced arrest at a "debate," fighting for our liberties. Judge Jim Gray (U.S. Senate) took a stand opposing the drug laws he is sworn to uphold. Our local candidates have also invested their hearts and souls to give voters a true, positive choice.

Mike Laursen (Congress Dist. 13) and Allen Rice (Senate Dist. 11) taped three-minute candidate statements at Mountain View's cable access station, KMVT. They'll air in three cities. five days a week through the election. The pair will also participate in League of Women Voters' candidate forum the evening of Oct. 21 at the Mountain View City Council chambers.

Laursen plans a direct mail campaign whose effectiveness will be measured by comparing the vote totals for each precinct with the general re-

sults. The data will be useful to future campaigns.

Zander Collier (Assembly Dist. 24) faced off

against Republican opponent Ernie Konnyu, at the Saratoga Library on Oct. 1. The candidate forum involved all three races affecting the residents of Saratoga. Democrat Rebecca Cohn did not attend.

Collier is planning a barrage of yard signs.

Brian Holtz (Congress Dist. 14) was interviewed by S.F. Examiner's Josh Wein (10/1). "On the whole, the article is quite accurate in its description of my campaign's message, and I'm grateful to the Examiner for covering thirdparty candidacies."

Holtz's innovative \$2 bet to voters who don't vote for him after reading his platform has instead yielded campaign contributions: the opposite of Holtz's purpose. So he has upped the ante to \$5.00 per nonvoter.

Say It Ain't So!

wo common killer objections to the LP don't I need to exist. Neither is valid; they're misstatements of two of our actual positions. When challenged, we try to explain-but we're not in the same conversation as the person objecting, so it doesn't work.

These two misunderstandings are keeping people out of the party. When we correct them as misunderstandings rather than defend the positions they pretend to define, people's interest in the party returns.

At Cupertino's Oktoberfest, I ran a "Find Your Political Position" booth. Two women took the "World's Smallest Political Quiz" together and scored solidly libertarian at 80% on both economic and personal free- LPSCC Chair and unofficial quiz proctor Allen doms. saying they were conservative political home at Cupertino's Oktoberfest. Republicans! They had read the LP platform about three years ago and had been turned off by a couple of our positions. "Which ones?" I inquired.

"Open borders!" said one, and from the other, "Free trade!"

I surprised them, as I might be about to surprise you. Neither of those is a Libertarian position. The women were at least as surprised as you might be right now.

How can I say this? Simple. "Free trade" is not the same as "free market," in that "free trade" is a neoconservative substitute term for "free market" and actually means something quite different.

A free market operates at the whim of billions of uncoordinated micro-decisions made by buyers and sellers all over the place. It is a chaotic sum in action, defined by itself as a phenomenon.

Conversely, free trade is government-managed commerce between nations. Government-defined, government-negotiated, and government-con-

strained, it's not at all free, since the government licenses every activity and entity involved.

That's a huge distinction. The LP officially and specifically opposes such arrangements in our Trade Barriers plank.

Unfortunately, the term "free trade" does appear once in the LP platform, but there is ample evidence that this is a mere style issue that can be corrected, given that the term "free market" appears nine other places, two in the section with the "free trade" error. I've requested a review.

"Open borders" means anyone going anywhere with no controls, while the LP's position is that honest people should be allowed to cross borders freely. You can't even state that position without implying that you're going to check people. How else are you to know that they're honest?

It's easy to see how the terms became misused within our conversation. "Free trade" sounds like "free market," and you can say it meaning either.

But what matters isn't what you mean, but what others hear. And they hear "government-defined, government-negotiated, and government-constrained" business as usual.

Same with open borders. It sounds like a logical opposite to *closed* borders, but we have neither, and we advocate neither. Our borders are not closed; immigration is regulated, not prevented. That either—or proposition is unacceptable. Reality dictates simply that we must be a little bit careful.

Go forth on these two issues and correct instead of defending. Of course, you may have to correct yourself first. Stop saying "free trade" and remember to say what we used to say, "free market." Instead of "open borders," say "reason-

able immigration policies," and then explain.

Those two women were excited and asked for the web address so they could revisit the LP. And in Reno in July, this method brought an old libertarian back into the fold and nabbed Badnarik for President an extra thousand dollars.

Just say it ain't so. Explain the difference. Life will be easier; the Party will expand; and apples will taste better. ■
