Libertarians Test Political Waters: Bill White's Campaign First in State

On April 8, in a special election to fill the vacant seat in the California Senate representing the 12th Senatorial District, long-time Libertarian activist Bill White will become the first candidate of the newly ballot-qualified Libertarian Party to seek election in 1980. The only candidate from Santa Clara County with previous experience (U.S. Senate candidate of the Libertarian Party in 1974), Bill received the unanimous endorsement of the Libertarian Council at the January County Convention. Bill's district includes Los Gatos, Saratoga, Cupertino, and adjacent parts of Los Altos, Campbell, San Jose, and Santa Clara. This was our best percentage vote area for Ed Clark in the 1978 gubernatorial campaign in Santa Clara County.

As an indicator of what to expect from the Libertarians this year, Bill's campaign will be watched by voters and media all over California. There is a good chance that Bill will draw sufficient votes from the other major candidates to force the election into a run-off. The run-off would be held in June and would feature the candidates who received the most votes from each qualified political party. The effect of a good showing for Bill in both April and June would be energizing to Libertarian campaigns all over California and could give us the equivalent of thousands of dollars of paid publicity for every other Libertarian race this year.

Bill's primary campaign committee, the Santa Clara Committee to Elect Libertarians, is concentrating its early attention on Bill's campaign for this reason. It is soliciting funds from all over California to be used in producing and distributing campaign materials for Bill's race. The materials will be designed for easy conversion to other candidates' campaigns for use in the June primary and November 1980 general elections. Ed Clark, Libertarian Party Presidential Candidate, to Visit Santa Clara County in March

On Friday, March 7, Libertarian Presidential candidate Ed Clark and his wife Alicia are scheduled to arrive in San Jose for a weekend tour. Tentative plans call for a news conference at the San Jose Municipal Airport followed by a noon speech at Stanford University, interviews with Santa Clara County newspapers, and



appearances on radio and television stations and an interview on KXRX-Radio at 8 P.M. Ed's wife, Alicia, who was born and raised in Mexico, is also scheduled for interviews on Spanish-speaking stations on both radio and television. Saturday's similarly hectic schedule will culminate in a gala fund raising banquet at Lou's Village Restaurant in San Jose.

California Libertarian Council Holds Convention in Irvine

Continuing the Washington's Birthday tradition, the Libertarian Council will hold its annual state convention February 15-18 at the Registry Hotel, 18800 MacArthur Blvd. in Irvine, California. This year's convention theme is "Strategies for Success in the Three Party System." Featured speakers include Nathaniel Branden, State Party Chair Dan Wiener, Keynote Speaker Manny Klausner, Laban Quimby, Presidential Banquet Master of Ceremonies Ed Crane, and Presidential Candidate Ed Clark. Seminars, workshops and films stress action within the current three party political system. Platform issues which may be considered at this convention include (1) the death penalty, (2) energy rationing, (3) criminal justice, (4) children's rights, and (5) the removal of rate of change determiners like "immediate," "eventual," and "gradual" from all planks. A report on convention results will appear in the next issue of Santa Clara Libertarian.

NOTES

- STANFORD STUDENTS FOR A LIBERTARIAN SOCIETY passed out literature at a debate between Nobel prize winning economist Milton Friedman and Congressman Pete McCloskey on December 14, 1979. The debate was part of conference on the voluntary military sponsored by Stanford's Hoover Institution, the University of Rochester, and the Alfred Sloan Foundation. According to the February issue of Frontlines (Box 40105, Santa Barbara, CA 93103), "the conference came to the informal conclusion that although the present AVF [all volunteer force] has some serious problems, it is still decidedly preferable to any return to conscription.
- The Ed Clark for President Campaign's National Headquarters offices opened in January 1980 at 2300 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W., Washington, DC 20007. Clark issued press releases and statements on foreign policy warning against President Carter's increasing tendency toward military intervention in the Middle East.
- MARCH 10, 1980 IS THE LAST DAY to register in order to vote for Bill White in the April 8th special election. Bill is the Libertarian Party candidate for the 12th State Senate District Seat which was vacated when Jerry Smith was appointed to a judgeship. April 8th will be the first election in Santa Clara County history in which a candidate has been designated "Libertarian" on the ballot.
- STANFORD LIBERTARIANS PLAN A full-page newspaper ad endorsing Ed Clark's candidacy for President, to appear in conjunction with Ed's Stanford appearance on March 7th. County Convention Elects Officers Endorses Candidates

The annual county convention met for the first time under its new name, Libertarian Council of Santa Clara County, on Jan. 17, 1980, at Santa Clara University. The convention chose a new set of officers and delegates to the State Convention (Feb. 15-18 in Irvine) and endorsed a slate of Libertarian candidates for public office.

The Council elected Mark Hinkle as its Chair. Russ Fridley is Vice-Chair, Lory DeAmicis is now Secretary and Jerry Gray returns as Treasurer. Dante DeAmicis is the new Publicity Chair, Karen Huffman takes over as Membership Chair and Les Guinivere was elected Research Chair. Gloria Rotunno no longer holds office, but to the great relief of the above-mentioned persons she has agreed to continue as editor of this newsletter.

Our State Executive Committee Representatives will be Mark Hinkle, Karen Huffman and Scott Olmstead. Ray Strong, Dante DeAmicis, Russ Fridley and Chuck Olson are the alternate Exec-Com Reps.

Sixteen delegates to this month's State Convention were chosen. Bill White, Kathy White, Dale Burrow, Gloria Rotunno, Ray Strong, Russ Fridley, Lory DeAmicis, Dante DeAmicis, Cary Kunz, Ross Parlette, Jim Wurm, Scott Olmstead, Karen Huffman, Mark Hinkle, Chuck Olson and Bill Evers will represent Santa Clara at the Convention in Irvine. The county Executive Committee will appoint alternates if needed.

The Council also endorsed a slate of candidates for the upcoming elections:

Ray Strong—13th Congressional District (Mineta).
Bill Evers—12th Congressional District (McCloskey).
John Redding—11th Senatorial District (Alquist).
Bill White—12th Senatorial District (Smith, retiring).
Chuck Olson—21st Assembly District (Calvo, retiring).
Russ Fridley—22nd Assembly District (Hayden, retiring).
Jim Wurm—23rd Assembly District (Vasconcellos).
Dante DeAmicis—24th Assembly District (Egeland).

Only Dante DeAmicis was challenged. Non-member Jack Woodside unsuccessfully sought Council endorsement (having previously announced to the press that he was the Libertarian candidate for the 24th district).

We begin 1980 with a new name, new officers and a new challenge—fielding a serious, believable set of candidates.



Banquet Inaugurates Local Libertarian Campaigns

To mark the beginning of the 1980 political campaign, a fundraising banquet for Santa Clara County Libertarian candidates was held Jan. 31, 1980 at San Jose's Casa Maria Restaurant. In all respects, it was a great success. The banquet was attended by 67 people and funds raised for the Committee to Elect Libertarians, a central finance committee for all local candidates, amounted to nearly \$1000 in cash and pledges. Furthermore, a number of people

pledged their time and effort to the upcoming campaigns. Finally, the food was good and most of the speeches were short.

The candidates addressed local and international issues, emphasizing the need to increase civil liberties and economic freedoms and stressing the need to limit dependence on government intervention. Winning a round of applause were Russ Fridley, who predicted this



will be a long year for smug and altruistic statists, Ray Strong, who declared that it is contradictory to have the home of the free defended by conscripted slaves, and John Redding, who told the audience that only the free market system and Libertarians who support it will work for their long-run best interests. Equally good were talks by Bill White on why people should vote for a Libertarian, by Jim Wurm on the libertarian solution to the drug problem, by Dante De Amicis on the resident-run community, and by Bill Evers on local Libertarian history.

The success of this banquet is largely attributable to the efforts of Cary Kunz and Tom Retson, who organized and carried out the entire affair, and Ken Watkins, who did a superb job as Master of





The enthusiasm generated by this banquet has gotten the 1980 Libertarian "educational" campaign off to an excellent start. The result will be an increase in the number of people who believe in Libertarian principles and who express that belief by casting their votes for our Libertarian Party candidates.

Help Abolish the Gasoline Tax: Initiative Petition Circulates in Santa Clara County

In the last issue of Santa Clara Libertarian, I promised you that we would have a plethora of petitions to circulate this year. We started off the new year with the marijuana initiative petitions and now another initiative, one which would eliminate the California gasoline sales tax, has begun the process necessary to qualify for the November ballot.

Copies of the "Abolish the Sales Tax" petitions are available from Liberty Book Store, 184 North Sunnyvale Avenue, Sunnyvale, California 94086, or from the Santa Clara Service Station Dealers Association, 236 East Caribbean Drive, Sunnyvale, California 94086. Mr. Paul R. Hay of the Santa Clara Gasoline Dealers Association, sponsors of the petition, said, "we will need to gather 346,119 valid signatures by May 1st, 1980 to place the initiative on the November 1980 ballot."

While this measure is not as broad as the "Abolish the Sales Tax" initiative which was endorsed by the Libertarian Party last year, it certainly is a step on the long road towards a taxless society. It takes only a few hours of your time to have your friends, neighbors, and coworkers sign. If passed by the voters, this initiative could save Californians \$400 million in taxes during 1980-81 and \$850 million in 1981-82.

California Makes 22
