Data shows Libertarian proposals have broad appeal

In the thirty years I've been involved in the LP, I have heard literally hundreds of "Libertarians" swear that there was "no constituency" for our "more radical" positions.

By the time these nervous nellies got finished listing all the things we shouldn't talk about, there would be nothing left for us to say at all.

But in many ways, the public is already light-years ahead of where we think they are. Carla Howell and Michael Cloud proved that with the 2002 ballot initiative to repeal the Massachusetts state income tax.

Despite being out-spent and out-volunteered by a factor of hundreds to one — the main opposition consisted of government employees terrified the measure meant the cooking of their stolen golden goose — the initiative won 45% of the vote.

Forty-five percent!

Forty-five percent despite the fact that a large fraction of the half-million government employees (250,000 local government, another 250,000 state government) actively campaigned against it, often while on taxpayer time (teachers, for instance, sent children home with anti-repeal flyers).

Despite the efforts of the tax-funded opposition, 45% of Massachusetts voters pulled the "Yes" lever.

Had there been an equal amount of money & volunteers available to the repeal effort, there is a very real possibility that the measure would have passed.

Another issue some Libertarians have screamed for their colleagues to avoid mentioning is repealing drug prohibition. I know of people who were sitting officers of the LP, or already-endorsed candidates for public office, who were loudly and rudely dressed-down in front of *LIBERTARIAN* audiences for mentioning the repeal of marijuana prohi-

bition. JUST marijuana — they mentioned no other drugs.

Yet here it is 2012, and a bunch of cracks in the wall of prohibition have suddenly appeared in Colorado and Washington, where recreational use of marijuana is now legal and another 17 states where it is decriminalized or medical marijuana is legal. Libertarians were involved — except for the naysayers.

Now let's talk about one of those unspeakables in our idea set: Secession.

There were so many "Libertarians" who wet their pants over that long-standing libertarian principle being in our platform, that in 2008 it was removed and replaced by a nebulous, "self determination" plank that doesn't even mention the right to secede. But is secession one of those third rails we should never talk about?

Hardly.

In an article on LewRockwell.com, Kirkpatrick Sale reviews some recent polling data by Public Policy Polling, of Raleigh, NC.

Among the more interesting finds: Secession is viewed positively/sympathetically by major fractions of various demographic groups. Here are a few examples:

By race: 46% (14 million) of Hispanics; 31% (49 million) of whites.

By ideology: 50% of conservatives (41 million); 19% (14 million) of liberals.

By sex: 35% of women and only 29% of men.

By age: 50% of 18-29 year olds.

LP NC Breaks Voter Registration Record

On Sunday, Ballot Access News reported that the latest North Carolina voter registration tally shows that 0.31% of the state's voters are registered as Libertarian. This is the highest percentage of registered voters that a third party has ever had in North Carolina since statistics began to be kept in 1966.

The old record for third party voter registration in North Carolina was set in October 1972 by the American Party, with a 0.30% share. The American Party gained ballot access in 1968 but lost ballot access after the 1972 election. When a party loses ballot access in North Carolina, the state converts the registered voters of that party to unaffiliated (independent) voters, thereby making a third party start all over again if it regains ballot access.

The Libertarian Party has lost ballot access in North Carolina twice, after the 1984 and 2004 elections. It was on continuously from 1976 to 1984, from 1996 to 2004, and from 2008 to present. Registration under the Libertarian banner has been rising steadily since 2008.


Libertarians Now Listed on D.C. Voter Registration Form

Sick of the government meddling in every last detail of your life? Wish that D.C. took a more isolationist stance toward the rest of the country? Do restaurant health inspections feel like an arbitrary burden?

Well, now you can let the D.C. Board of Elections know, because the newest revision to the District's voter registration form includes the Libertarian Party as one of the printed choices. Though they have never held elected office in the District, the Libertarians finally achieved major-party status last year when Bruce Majors, a challenger to Democratic Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton, carried enough votes to secure formal recognition for their party organization.

Majors needed 7,500 votes to make the Libertarians a major party. Last November 6, he got that and plenty more, eventually racking up more than twice the threshold. While Norton, who was never in danger of losing, collected about 15 times as many votes, Majors still outpolled his party's presidential candidate, former New



Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson, by a 10-to-one margin.

Now a major party, the Libertarians will be listed on voter registration forms, be permitted to hold party primaries, and are required to submit their bylaws to the Board of Elections.

The point is this: Secession is not an idea that only libertarians have entertained. As the above survey results show, there is a substantial cohort of Americans out there who not only feel secession is appropriate in some cases, but who are right now in favor of it.

Do we jump out in front of this parade, or tiptoe into the line behind everyone else once it becomes popular, as some "Libertarians" would have us believe?

Whenever there is a market for an idea we long since staked out as our own, we don't need to hide from it and worry about whether Americans will find the idea palatable. All we have to do is speak to them like they are adults who are capable of discuss-

ing ideas with a level head.

But we have to speak to them! We can't speak to them if we're cowering behind them in the parade.

Let's speak loudly and clearly about the kind of free society we seek. In doing so, we will find these people. Once we find them, they can be invited to join our coalition!

There is **NO** limit to how large the Libertarian movement (and Party) can grow. As shown above, on just one issue, there are 50 to 60 million people who are receptive to the "extremist" idea of secession. There are millions more (with some amount of overlap) on every other issue in our toolbox.
