Monthly Pledge Total Rebounds By Nearly \$4,000

Last month I wrote about how vital monthly pledgers like you are to the Libertarian Party's survival in this down economy.

I talked about how the LNC lowered our national budget from \$1.6 million in 2008 to \$1.2 million in 2009, and how our monthly pledge income had dropped from \$24,468 at the end of 2008, to only \$20,504 in August 2009.

Well, we had a great September!

Special thanks goes to one major donor who was responsible for putting us about halfway toward our goal. He had this to say:

"Politics is all about people and after reading Wes' note asking for monthly donations, it was easy to contribute. I've know Wes since he was executive director in Texas, and now that he is at national, I feel very confident in making a large donation because Wes will make sure it is well spent on promoting liberty and a smaller government."

It's always nice to sign up a surprise large contributor, but we also worked hard to recruit more people at the typical \$10 to \$50 per month range. We got the number of monthly contributors up from 902 to 940.

So, at \$24,301 for September, we're close to reaching our December goal.

A special thanks to our 20 new monthly pledgers in September who are listed on page 3. (The September count is higher because some people resumed in September whose cards did not process in August.)

I've served as your Executive Director now for about three months. While our monthly pledge program is going well, I don't want to give the false impression that all is well.

Our total number of what we call "active donors" (people who have contributed \$25 or more in the past 12 months, plus Life members) has declined.

In December 2008, we had 16,349 "active donors." By August 2009, the number had dropped to 14,975. In September, the number dropped again to 14,331.

I'm not fibbing when I tell you the decline makes me nervous and also keeps me awake at night.

I do think I have pinpointed a few improvements that will turn those numbers around. For example, I think we haven't been sending enough renewal letters to our expired members, and I don't think those letters have been high enough quality. I've got a big test mailing going out now that may help a lot, but of course I'll be nervous until I find out for sure.

As Executive Director of the Libertarian Party of Texas, I was able to produce record fundraising and membership growth. Additionally, the first fundraising letter I helped produce here at national headquarters out-performed all of the other letters sent in 2009. So, I am feeling cautiously confident.

I am very grateful to the monthly pledgers like you who provide the stability and financial security we need to allow us to make medium-term plans.

Thanks again for your dedication and support.

I spoke at a Tea Party group meeting in Plymouth in mid-September. I explained how the Libertarian Party was the only party of limited government and free markets, and the whole room was nodding. They agreed with me that government is too big, that liberty is important, and that the role of government is to secure rights, not take from one group to give to others. They were nodding like Bobbleheads! But then that dreaded question came: "Since we have to beat the Democrats next year, isn't it best to support Republican candidates who can win instead of splitting the limited government vote?" Unfortunately, many nodded in agreement with that statement, too.

After 30 years as a Libertarian, this argument is getting tiresome to me. The obvious truth is if people vote for Libertarians they will win. All those supporters of limited government who have been voting Republican since Richard Nixon have brought us to the mess we're in today. Republicans--whose mission, by the way, is not limited government, but electing more Republicans--have supported bigger government at every turn: a bigger government for War, Welfare, Health, Education, Immigration, Business, Banking, you name it.

They had the presidency and control of both houses of Congress and wouldn't cut government. In fact, those in the Republican Party who espouse limited government, such as Dr. Ron Paul, are routinely marginalized. Republicans haven't heeded the call for less intervention, regulation and taxes in my memory. After decades of evidence to the contrary, why do tea party activists believe Republicans will suddenly take their message seriously now?

I asked the tea party folks that night to send a stronger signal: Do something that will let everyone know you're serious about wanting smaller government and liberty for Americans. Don't "split the limited government vote" by voting for Republicans; vote Libertarian. If everyone over the past 37 years who thought government was too big had voted for Libertarians, we'd be in much better shape today.

Not only would we have more champions of limited government in office, but the argument that people have a right and responsibility to be independent and manage their own affairs would be stronger and clearer. Maybe we wouldn't, once again within a score of years, be talking about nationalizing health care (another argument I'm sick of). It's time to cut the losses society's incurred by voting for ersatz limited governmentalists. It's time all the independents, libertarians, and people who value freedom vote for what they believe in and unite behind Libertarian Party candidates in 2010 so they can WIN. Thanks to all of you who are sending a clear message for less government and more freedom by supporting the Libertarian Party in Michigan!

Trembly says she and the party are working out a petition which will either repeal the ordinance or allow for some exemptions.

The Topeka City Council measure approved last week bans smoking in most public places, including bars and restaurants. It's to take effect December 4th.
