A group of approximately 45 Colorado Libertarians rewarded two internationally prominent Libertarians with standing ovations at the CLP convention held April 24-25 in Fort Collins: former 1980 LP Presidential nominee Ed Clark, the recipient of the largest number of Libertarian votes before or since, and Bruce Evoy, the founder of the Libertarian Party of Canada.

Clark reminisced about the glory days of the 1980 campaign, which resulted in almost one million votes cast for the Libertarian presidential nominee, and speculated the 1992 LP Presidential ticket of Andre Marrou and Nancy Lord would break his 12-year-old record, despite the H. Ross Perot phenomena. Clark noted that every year voter dissatisfaction is

Boulder Libertarian writes constitution for proposed sovereign island-based nation

Imagine the problems facing an individual asked to write a constitution for a new nation which would not trample on the rights of its citizens: Most people never face this dilemma, but Kevin Bloom, Chairman of the Boulder County Libertarian Party, has tackled the problem head on.

Working on a request from a friend who believes it possible to found a sovereign island nation on Libertarian principles and developing his document largely from the writings of Lysander Spooner and John Locke, Bloom has developed a constitution for a laissez-faire constitutional monarchy in which the elected king has no power to make or enforce law and all governmental decisions are made by the unanimous consent of the citizen-shareholders.

The fundamental Lockian principles of right to person and right to property figure prominently in Bloom's proposed constitution, as does Spooner's requirement that unanimous consent be the basis for governmental action.

Two islands, Highbourne Cay in the Bahamas and the Polynesian island of Port Watson, have been considered by the group Bloom is involved with as possible sites for implementing the proposed constitution. A group of 200 "founding shareholders" interested in populating the proposed new nation is being assembled, but names, addresses and telephone

numbers of the individuals involved are being kept confidential. Bloom, however, has twice addressed the public about the group's activities: in April at the CLP convention in Fort Collins and in May at the Boulder County Libertarian Party's monthly meeting.

Bloom said he would talk to interested persons individually.

Serious investigation of the project began, Bloom said, after an acquaintance of his was consulted by a remote Polynesian nation about gaining international recognition in the diplomatic community. Had the acquaintance been successful in gaining the requested recognition, his reward would have been a sovereign island.

This triggered a chain of thought: What if there is an island on the market somewhere in the world where the dream could be realized?

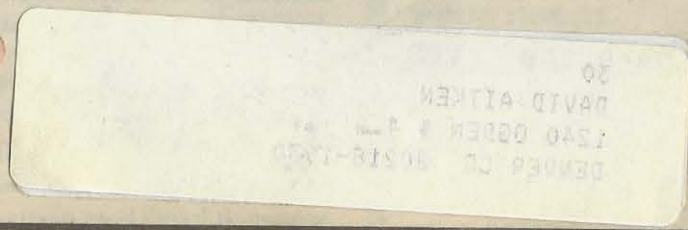
An investigation revealed an island named Highbourne Cay in the Bahamas, owned by a single family who wants to sell it. Although the island is not currently sovereign and is under the gentle administration of the Bahamian government, Bloom said the group he represents has retained a Bahamian lawyer to investigate these and other legal questions about the ramifications of trying to establish a new sovereign nation there.

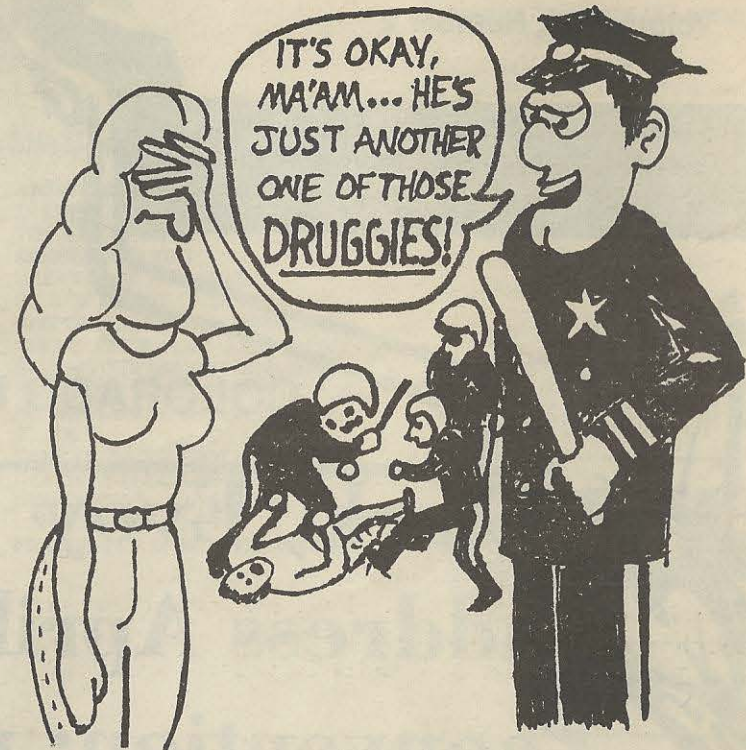
Hope. That's what the Libertarian message is all about. We offer hope to people whose lives are being strangled by the government. But we can't offer hope to them if they don't know about us.

Our biggest immediate task is ballot access: getting Andre Marrou and Nancy Lord, our presidential and vice-presidential candidates, on the ballot. We do this only by collecting petition signatures. If we don't do this, there will not be anyone on the ballot offering voters real hope for improvement in their lives. Please make a commitment to help by calling either myself or Chris Bogart, our new campaigns director.

I feel it's important to focus on issues of middle class concern — health care, education and tax reform are three that almost every voter can identify with. Over the past two years, I have come in contact with several ideas which I feel we can support.

Two ideas concerning health care (insurance) and education are from the same source — J. Patrick Rooney, President of the Golden Rule Insurance Company. Mr. Rooney has set up a charitable foundation to provide poor people with a privately-funded voucher to attend private schools. It's been very successful and efforts are underway to start a similar program here in Colorado. His other idea



Tax reform is an idea being promoted by Citizens for an Alternative Tax System — CATS for short. They are suggesting replacing the income tax and the social security tax with a national sales tax. If implemented, this would encourage savings and investment, eliminate the underground economy, and stimulate sales by leaving more money in everyone's pockets.

Hasn't the media's attention to "alternative" candidates been fascinating this year? First there was David Duke, then Pat Buchanan, then Jerry Brown, now H. Ross Perot.

It's encouraging. At this rate, they'll eventually get around to splashing Andre Marrou's name all over the front pages.

But before that happens we have to get Andre Marrou on the ballot. There might be some Libertarians out there who are getting caught up in the Perot fever the media is whipping up, and that might be one reason we're behind schedule on Marrou petitioning this year.

Campaigns Director Chris Bogart suspects that signing petitions for both Perot and Marrou causes the first signature to be turned in to negate the second signature turned in. Let's play it safe: please sign only petitions for Andre Marrou.

Who is this man, H. Ross Perot, anyway? Let's review what we know about him.

He's rich (because he's been sucking up taxpayer dollars for decades), he's a Texan (notice how all the major candidates are good ol' boys from Texas or Arkansas?), and he's a Republican (with corrupt Republican friends like Richard Nixon).

During on-the-record, broadcast interviews with C-SPAN and NBC, he has advocating "amending" the Constitution to restrain the media from making early projections of elections or to declare martial law on drug dealers, placing them in POW camps.

The Orange County Register quoted Perot as saying his continuation of the Reagan-Bush drug war "won't be pretty". Well, in my opinion, it hasn't been pretty so far.

Todd Mason, author of "Perot: An Unauthorized Biography, claims that Perot told a friendly crowd of police

and narcotics.

He has advocated mandatory, universal conscription; he has espoused oligarchical micro-management of troubled American corporations; he doesn't like free trade, and seems to admire the Japanese way of doing things (protectionism and oligarchy); and he's a gun control advocate.

So let's see: he doesn't like the First Amendment (since he wants to restrict the media); he's no friend of the Second Amendment (due to his gun control advocacy); he apparently doesn't understand the Fourth Amendment (cordon and searching entire neighborhoods doesn't sound like being free from unreasonable search and seizure to me); his drug war stance puts him in support of drug testing (which violates Fifth Amendment prohibitions against self-incrimination); and so on. Perot's election would be interpreted by statist, authoritarians and prohibitionists nationwide as a mandate for the dismantling of the Bill of Rights.

I've seen busy Perot petitioners with easily legible signs on the Boulder mall and at King Soopers stores. It's time we put the Marrou/Lord campaign in front of the public in the same way.

Let's start making some noise about our candidate. The media likes to see excitement, enthusiasm, pageantry and bandwagon politics; let's give it to them.

One of the duties I'm looking forward to as the new state Communications Director is distributing a press release announcing that the Marrou/Lord ticket has gained ballot access in Colorado. I had hoped to do that before Perot's supporters announce his ballot success in the state, but let's at least make sure that the process is complete by August.

Convention authorizes revival of Colorado Liberty; 1st issue due 6-21

New members of the Colorado Libertarian Party might not recall that, seven to ten years ago, the party published more of a newspaper than a newsletter called the **Colorado Liberty**. The last edition was published in 1985.

Convention-going members of the CLP voted in April, by electing Ron Bain to the post of Communications Director, to revive the **Colorado Liberty** as a public outreach tool.

Bain proposes quarterly publication of a tabloid newspaper (with emphasis on news analysis and issues reporting), with the first edition to be published on June 21st. A Communications Sub-Committee, which will direct the publication of the **Liberty** as well as

other Communications activities, is being formed under Bain's directorship; people with backgrounds in writing, desktop publishing, printing or distribution are being sought on a statewide basis. Contact Bain at (303) 449-3809 to volunteer for the Communications Sub-Committee.

The purpose of the paper, which will have a small "l" libertarian emphasis, will be to present news that clearly demonstrates libertarian principles, such as a tax seizure that puts a family out on the streets or a pot bust involving an 82-year-old lady who uses the stuff for her glaucoma.
