Special Elections in April

Beaufort: Chuck Williams of Hilton Head is the Libertarian candidate for Beaufort County Council District 1 (vacant because the incumbent won election to the SC House.) The special election will be held April 22. Chuck will face the winner of the Republican primary. No Democrat has filed. Chuck's campaign is continuing to receive regular press attention, to a large degree as a result of the Republican opposition. Both local newspapers, as well as the local radio outlets continue to report that "the winner of the February Republican primary will face Libertarian Chuck Williams

in the April 22 Special Election" every time they report on the primary. Chuck has already had speaking engagements with the Hilton Head Kiwanis Club and Toastmasters.

Charleston: Rodney Travis of North Charleston is the S.C. Libertarian candidate for County Council North Area district, vacant because the incumbent died. The special election will be April 22. Rodney will face the winners of the Republican & Democrat primaries in the county-wide election. Rodney said, "County govt should provide basic services, such as police protection, and get away from offering services best left to private businesses."

Privatizing Social Security, a Libertarian Perspective

The recent proposals to invest Social Security funds in equities (ie the stock market) should be a cause for concern for all Libertarians. While the concept has a superficially "free market" ring to it, in practice it would likely lead to a fascist state.

Consider the proposals from an⁷⁻⁷¹³⁸ economic perspective:

- 1) All of the proposals call for the federal government to maintain control over most, if not all of the investment funds. This would mean that the rules would likely require that the investments only be made in "Blue Chip" companies. In other words, the largest industrial companies would be subsidized at the expense of their smaller competitors. Even if the rules allowed for nvestments in startup companies, the result would still be politicization of capital investment, which is in diametric opposition to free market concepts.
- 2) The proposals call for an increase in Social Security taxes. This would mean that smaller companies (and sole proprietorships) would be forced to invest in their larger competition while

the "Blue Chip" companies would effectively get a tax break.

3) With "public" monies heavily invested in the large corporations, they would become "too big to fail" with the result that they would no longer be responsive to market forces.

- 4) While there are apparent capital gains in the Dow stocks, the dividend yield for these stocks is now well below that of the interest that the US Treasury "pays" on the existing Social Security debt. To assume that profits for these corporations will increase to the point where the yield will exceed that of treasury debt is optimistic, to say the least.
- 5) Although capital gains currently greatly exceed returns on debt, they cannot be realized until the underlying securities are liquidated. When equities are liquidated, the price generally declines. The "value" of a security is what the market will bear.

From a political perspective, consider:

1) The relationship between the German National Socialists (Nazis) and the

large German industrial corporations was cozy to say the least. World War II in its earlier stages was of onsiderable benefit to these corporations and would have been unlikely without their wholehearted support, if not instigation. (For background, read Manchester's "The Arms of Krupp.")

- 2) Relations between the federal government and large industrial concerns are already too close in many areas. In the past 2 years, the US has succeeded in angering both the Japanese and French governments because of industrial espionage performed by the CIA and NSA. (Didn't hear about it? Perhaps you should read the British publication The Economist or the German Der Spiegel occasionally instead of Time and Newsweek.)
- 3) Large organizations of any variety are inimical to individual rights.

The ONLY rational Libertarian position on these proposals should be to completely dismantle the Social Security System and allow Americans to handle their own retirement.


