

THE ABSOLUTE LAST WORD UP-TO-THE-MINUTE RUNDOWN

Let's start with MONDAY. The Oil and the Mid-East panel has broadened slightly and will now be called "OIL AND POLITICS." Historian Joseph Peden will moderate a panel that will include Dr. Murray Rothbard, John Hagel and Dennis Turner.

You will notice, in the master schedule on pages 10 and 11, some changes in both the Action Series and the Free Lunch Series. First of all, there will be only one FLS per day with the exception of Thursday, when there will be two: an Education Panel discussing alternatives to public education, repealing compulsory education laws, and how to get from here to there...or...Roy Childs with some hard facts about hard drugs and why they should not be illegal.

In the last newsletter, we inadvertently ommitted Bob Steiner's workshop on Public Speaking. It should be #3B, scheduled for Tuesday afternoon. Action #4 has been changed to "Petitions and Ballot Drives" with Howie Rich of New York and others. We've found that the basic "how to" material is the same all over the country, so what some states have been through, others can learn from. Not to be missed.

Action #8 is now called "Communications" and will feature Bill Westmiller on "Media," David Grant on "Public Relations" and Paul Streitz on "Advertising."

The Feminism Panel should be quite exciting...Fran Youngstein, Lynn Kinsky and Sharon Presley debate ERA and other topics...moderated by our leading resident MCP, Dr. Walter Block.

Now, about GAWPEC on Tuesday night. Everybody is buying tickets for this event even though they don't have the slightest notion just what the hell it's all about. We don't know either...but tentatively it will include tips on such things as special tax deductions, alternatives to banking your savings and a discussion on whether The Apocalypse has been postponed.

The Tax Strike Seminar (on Sunday, not Saturday) will feature Karl Bray, noted tax rebel, Hank Hohenstein, author of "IRS Conspiracy" and James Dale Davidson, Director of the National Taxpayers Union.

To open the actual convention there will be an exciting 5-7 minute multi media presentation on New York City. Dr. John Hospers will deliver the Keynote Address: "A Bill of Goods."

The Thursday night reception at 5 PM will feature short talks by each of the Presidential candidates. Drinks will be served afterwards and delegates will have an opportunity to talk with the candidates. There will be no reception Friday evening.

Some notes about the Breakfast Series...yes, breakfast <u>is</u> included (unlike the Free Lunch Series, where lunch is not included because everyone knows that there ain't no such thing).

David Friedman's talk Thursday morning will be "An Appreciation of Nozick's 'Anarchy, State & Utopia'." Nozick might possibly give a few comments.

Jeffrey St. John (Sunday) will speak on "The American or French Revolution: Which Way For The West?"




announced 15 February 1975

ROGER MACBRIDE

Charlottesville, Virginia

Roger MacBrike is an attorney and author. He cast the first electoral vote ever for a Libertarian candidate (John Hospers, '72) and the first electoral vote ever for a female candidate (Tonie Nathan, '72). He has been one of the most active speakers for libertarianism, crisscrossing the country in his own plane (at his own expense) for this purpose.

GUY RIGGS

Poughkeepsie, New York

Guy Riggs has been employed by IBM for the last 23 years. He was the very first Libertarian candidate, running for New York Assemblyman in 1972. He ran again for the same post in 1974. He organized the Mid-Hudson Libertarian Club and writes frequent libertarian guest columns for the Poughkeepsie Journal.

KAY HARROFF

Cleveland, Ohio

Kay Harroff is a businesswoman and founder of the Libertarian Party of Ohio. She was in charge of arrangements for the 1973 LP Convention. She served as regional representative to the national ExeComm and recently was elected by them as an At-Large member. In 1974 she ran for U.S. Senate, receiving almost 80,000 votes. She is Chairman of the Ohio LP.

Those of you who received the June newsletter will be amazed to hear that it is now after July 31 and we do not have the city of New York anything like all to ourselves! Although with the heat wave we had last weekend, it's a wonder the Labor Day exodus didn't begin a month early. Of course, as most of you arrive the city will still be teeming with New Yorkers, and public transportation will be operating at what passes for peak efficiency around here.

ARRIVAL: Those arriving by plane have a multiple choice of tactics. In keeping with our promise to help save you money, we present a full rundown of these, including The Three Cheapest Ways (*) to Get from the Airports to the Statler:

JFK INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

Cab: About \$15.00 (fastest).

Carey Bus: (Carey is a private bus company that runs regular direct service from the airports to the city.) \$3.50 from airport to East Side Airlines Terminal, plus cab fare to hotel. Probably about \$5.00-\$6.00 total. (Second fastest -- about ½ hour.) (*) Q-10 Green Line Bus: Take this bus to the Union Turnpike/Kew Gardens subway station for 35¢. Then take the IND (Independent) subway "E" to Penn Station or "F" train to 34th Street (Herald Square) in Manhatten. You will emerge 1 block or less from the hotel. 35¢. Total cost: 70¢. (Slow -- about 1½ hours -- but sure, and cheap.)

LAGUARDIA AIRPORT:

Cab: About \$6.00-\$7.00 (fastest).

Carey: \$3.00 to Terminal plus cab fare to hotel, about \$5.00 total. (Second fastest).

(*) #33 Bus: Take the good ol' #33 to Roosevelt Ave./Jackson Heights subway station for 35¢. You then have a choice of subways, both 35¢. The IND "E" train will take you direct to Penn Station, the "F" or "EE" to Herald Square (34th St.), both are a short walk to the Statler. The IRT #7 train takes you to Times Square from which you have to take a cab (about \$1.00), but you do get a skyline view on the way in. DO NOT TAKE A "GG" TRAIN unless you want to spend the day exploring Brooklyn. Total cost using the IND: 70¢. (Slow, about 1 hour.)

NEWARK AIRPORT:

Cab: STAY OUT OF CABS IF YOU ARE COMING FROM NEWARK. It can easily run you \$20.00.

Carey: \$4.00. The Port Authority claims that Carey doesn't run to Newark. Carey claims it does. I tend to believe Carey, but if they don't, simple take:

(*) Transport of New Jersey #300 bus: goes direct to the PABT (Port Authority Bus Terminal) for \$1.75, from whence take a cab to the hotel. Total cost about \$3.00. The bus leaves every half hour and takes under an hour to the bus terminal.

PLEASE NOTE: "FAST" REFERS TO TRAVEL DURING NON-RUSH HOURS. NOTHING IS FAST AT 9:00 OR 5:00!

Those planning to come by train will find getting to the hotel easiest. If you come into Pennsylvania Station, go upstairs and across the street (7th Avenue). If you draw Grand Central, proceed through the concourse, admiring the way it looks now that it's finally been cleaned, out onto 42nd St. (no, not the wicked end. Sorry.), or Vanderbilt Ave., and get a cab to the Statler. Should cost under \$2.00. Or walk 2 blocks west to 5th Ave. and take the #4 bus to Penn Station. You will need exact fare -- 35¢ on the busses.

If you take a bus you will probably land up at Port Authority Bus Terminal. Take a cab to the hotel for about \$1.00. Or, go out the 9th Ave. side of the terminal and take the M16 bus to the corner of 34th St. and 7th Ave. Walk 1 block south to Statler.

And now a word (or 5) about New York TAXIS:

- (1) The fare is 65¢ for the first 1/10 mile and 10¢ for each additional 1/10 mile.
- (2) Tips are 15%-20% of the fare.
- (3) Suitcases travel free; there is a 50¢ charge for each trunk.
- (4) One fare is paid covering all riders. 4 riders are allowed in an ordinary car-type cab, 5 in a Checker cab. Checker cabs are big boxy ones with two extra fold-down seats. If you have a lot of luggage, they are worth waiting for (and they are quite plentiful).

(5) New York cabbies have gained much notoriety for their temperaments (generally undeserved) and for their driving (generally understated). When backseat driving, gasping and flinching are acceptable, but screaming aloud is considered chicken. (P.S. I've ridden in them for 8½ years without a single accident.)

Lastly, for you optimists who intend to DRIVE, I have 3 suggestions:

(1) DON'T. (2) Park the car at a railraod station or other facility outside the city and take the train in. (3) If you must drive in, park in a garage. The Statler provides valet service at the door for \$7.00 for 24 hours. Cheaper rates include: 42nd Street & 8th Avenue for \$5.19/24 hrs; 53rd St. and 8th Ave. for \$4.72/24 hrs; 38th Street between 1st and 2nd Avenues for \$4.75/24 hrs.

CHECK-IN: Once safely deposited at the Statler, register for your rooms (tell them you are with the convention, please) at the main registration desk, then proceed up the escalator (or come down in the elevators if you just can't wait to see your luxurious accommodations and get rid of the suitcases first) to the MEZZANINE, Where All The Action Is. Registration for the convention will be in the Hartford and/or Cleveland rooms, and hours will be from 8:30 AM to Midnight. (DON'T wake us up at 4:00 AM to tell us you're here. We'll see you in the morning - the REAL morning.)

CRASH SPACE: Two systems are being set up to provide "crash space" for those who have requested less expensive accommodations. We will also have information on lower rates in nearby hotels.

- (1) "Quad," or 4-bed rooms in the Statler go for \$40 per day. If you can afford \$10 a day (or \$12 to share a triple, or \$13 to share a double), please send us your name and preferences and we will team you up with 1, 2, or 3 roommates of the same sex.
- (2) For those who really need a free place to stay, we are doing our best to find space for you with party members and others around town. If you've already requested it, we're already working on it. If not, send your name and requirements to:

Coordinating will be done at convention headquarters (Mezz.) so come there first. Please keep in mind that New York is not an "automobile" city and that most crash space will involve using public transportation to and from the convention.

SPEAKING OF WHICH, as you have no doubt heard, the city bus, subway and even (let us observe a moment of silence) the Staten Island Ferry fares are going up September 1st. This should not affect most of you, since the city has instituted ½ fares on Sundays and holidays. We are tentatively planning to buy subway tokens to sell at cost as a service, and will provide free bus and subway maps at the desk.

CHILDREN: Please let us know if you are planning to bring children age 14 or under. We are arranging for babysitting service for the very young, and supervised activities around New York for older kids. And children OF ALL AGES stay free at the hotel in the same room as the parent(s).

FOOD: Due to the high cost of the Statler's coffee, we suggest that you bring a thermos with you if convenient. There are several dozen eateries in the neighborhood who undersell the Statler by a mile, and we hope to have gophers to keep the caffeine flowing during the convention. Full information on restaurants and other food sources (including health food stores) will be available free at the desk.

If you have any questions about accommodations when you arrive, I'll be hanging around the registration desk with the red notebook (if I can get it back from Marc Travis). Just let me take this crochet hook out of my teeth and I'll be glad to help.

Well, our Saturday Breakfast speaker will be Mark Tier of the Workers Party to talk about libertarian activities Down Under.

At last, the "theatrical" has a name...it's called TRASH and it's a very funny musical satire starring Marshall Bruce Evoy, Jean Preece, featuring Gary Greenberg, Ray Cunningham and Andrea Millen. 

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

JIM TROTTER of Santa Barbara, California announced in June his intention to seek the Libertarian Party nomination for Vice President. He was a member of a libertarian faction within Students for a Democratic Society in the late 1960s, and was involved in the antiwar movement. For the last two years, Trotter has been selling gold and silver coins and giving seminars on hard money investment. He is a member of both the Santa Barbara Libertarian Party and the Peace and Freedom Party. He was a precinct worker for the school board campaigns of Lynn Kinsky and Ruth Sutton earlier this year. He is an ex-marine and a member of the National Rifle Association.

TONIE NATHAN of Eugene, Oregon announces her Vice Presidential availability in this issue of our Convention Newsletter. She has been a music publisher, insurance agent, interior decorator and television & radio producer. She has a B.A. in Journalism and is a free-lance broadcaster, investigative reporter and columnist. In 1972 she was the Libertarian Party candidate for Vice President and became the first woman ever to receive an electoral college vote. She is the founder and president of ALF, Association of Libertarian Feminists.



THE ACTIVIST

Rod Van Orden is an activist. He was born in Niagara Falls, New York, and has lived in the south bay area of Los Angeles for the last 18 years. As an active member of his community, he participated in scouting as an Eagle Scout, registered voters as a deputy registrar, and campaigned for Barry Goldwater in 1964.


In 1969 at UCLA Rod served as Chairman of the Young Americans for Freedom. He became disenchanted with "politics-as-usual" and dropped out of all activity until June 19th, 1970, when he cosigned the Declaration of Revolution at Independence Hall in Philadelphia. Rod has a degree in Administration of Justice, and is a potential LP candidate for Congress against Alphonzo Bell of California's 27th district.

Rod Van Orden became a libertarian after studying the works of Ludwig von Mises. He contributed to the formation of the Libertarian Party in 1971, and attended the first national LP convention in Denver, Colorado. In 1974 Rod became vice-chairman of his local LP chapter. As a delegate to the 1975 California LP State Convention, he led the successful floor fight against deadly experimentation on live human infants. Currently, Rod Van Orden is Treasurer of a dark-horse campaign to nominate a winning candidate for President of the United States at the 1975 LP National Convention in New York City.

The LRA plans to introduce two resolutions at the Convention. The first resolution will state: RESOLVED - THE PRESIDENTIAL AND VICE PRESIDENTIAL NOMINEES OF THE LIBERTARIAN PARTY WILL MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO SECURE NOMINATION FOR THE SAME OFFICES BY THE REP-THEY WILL COMPETE IN ALL REPUBLICAN PRESIDENTIAL UBLICAN PARTY. PRIMARIES AND APPEAR BEFORE ALL REPUBLICAN DELEGATE SELECTION CON-VENTIONS. Of course, the LRA does not expect that the LP candidates will actually obtain the GOP nominations. We firmly believe that the attempt is nonetheless worthwhile.

Libertarianism would receive much more publicity than it has ever received before, resulting in millions of voters being exposed to our principles. Additionally, as proportional division of delegates is required by many state election laws, our candidates would be sure to win some delegates to the Republican National Convention. We would thus be treated to the thrilling spectacle of watching them nominated at next year's RNC, live on network TV. (A similiar effort by Conservatives at the RNC of 1960 - nominating Barry Goldwater for President - served as a springboard for

their capture of the GOP four years later.)

The second resolution that we intend to introduce will state: RESOLVED - IN THE EVENT THAT A CONSERVATIVE THIRD PARTY IS ESTAB-LISHED IN 1976, THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE LIBERTARIAN PARTY WILL DETERMINE IF IT IS POSSIBLE TO CONSTRUCT A LIBERTARIAN-CON-SERVATIVE FUSION TICKET. IF SUCH IS FOUND TO BE THE CASE, THE FUSION TICKET WILL BE SUBSTITUTED FOR THE LP'S ORIGINAL SLATE. The LRA believes that the formation of a Conservative third party is probable. The thrust of this party could be either pure Conservative, Conservative-Wallacite or Libertarian-Conservative. In the latter eventuality the construction of a Fusion ticket should certainly be considered.

The passage of this resolution would actually increase the chances that any Conservative third party would have a Libertarian-Conservative thrust. For the Conservatives would be put on notice that an additional political force - the Libertarian Party would be allied with them if a Fusion ticket could be constructed.

If the LRA's two resolutions are to have a chance of passing each of you who agrees with one or both of them must help in every way possible. If you are a delegate please vote for them. If you are not a delegate please tell your delegates that you are in favor of their passage.


