

INPUT ON IMPORTS

The U.S. House recently held hearings on the effects of foreign imports on the American market place in Rock Hill on November 26. Local York County L.P. Chair, Cliff Ross, submitted to the committee several articles and a letter explaining the Libertarian position on government intervention, and a defense of the concept of a Free Market.

While the committee mainly concentrated on 'textile imports,' the principled Libertarian approach should enliven the issue by calling for a halt to the protectionist attitude held by many congressmen.

BERGLAND TRAILS MONDALE by 13 Electorial Votes

David Bergland and Jim Lewis were on the ballot in 38 states and D.C. and recieved fewer votes than did Ed Clark four years ago. However, the L.P. got more votes as a party than they did those four years ago, the party is growing from a grassroots level and will continue to expand in the future.

In S.C. the L.P. jumped in vote totals from .5% four years ago to over 2% statewide, a marked increase in vote totals and recognition. We ran as many candidates for congress as did the Republicans.

In several races around the country it was the Libertarian vote that made and broke many races. We had Andre Marrou elected to the Alaska state house, Tom Tryon to a county commission in California, and J.R.Myers to a county commission in Montana, they will join the more than fifty Libertarians holding office around the country.

During the campaign several noteworthy items took place: TV comedian Jimmy Walker endorsed Steve Givot for the U.S. Senate in Chicago, Givot was also endorsed by the Nat'l Conservative P.A.C., Jim Hedbor, our U.S. Congressional candidate from vermont was endorsed by 4 newspapers including the largest in Vermont, the "Burlington Free Press".





COMMENTS

Since we're in the business of selling freedom, you might think we're a little heavy in inventory right now. We were an electorial flop in major party terms with only 1 to 4% of the vote in most races. However, we are growing and getting stronger.

Some observations on Campaign `84 form my vantage point as manager of the Davis for Senate campaign. If you think the notion of freedom was not selling this year, forget it. You are dead wrong. We simply aren't translating positive sentiment into votes for the Libertarian Party. Not yet. At least 10 to 15% of the people believe what we are saying is right. They just aren't ready to break rank with 'established party'. Not yet. Our actual votes are just the tip of the iceberg.

Never has this party been so well run, so division free, so visible, so well known, respected, and supported. This year was exciting. The Davis campaign issued press releases, maintained a toll free phone line, held press conferences, passed out tons of material, wowed high school and college crowds, showed miles of video tape, and travelled the entire state, 12,000 miles, with over 360 interviews, not to mention the television ads. The responce was superb. All for \$ 15,000.

I, also, got a chance to work with all of our congressional candidates. I couldn't be prouder to know any bunch of people. They worked hard, they sacrificed, they spread the word. All apeared on ETV, which was a major boost. We had many breakthroughs. Ray Pike was declared the winner of the first debate (televised) in the 4th district by the Spartanburg Herald. The Anderson Independent wrote a very complimentary lead editorial

FEDERAL PRIMARY MATCHING FUNDS SPENT

On September 20, 1984, the Federal Election Commission certified additional primary matching fund payments for four Presidential primary candidates, bringing total funds certified to 11 Presidential primary candidates to \$ 33,017,997.82

The summary chart below provides cumulative information on certifications of primary matching funds made between January 1 and September 20. 1984.

often get votes of deceased voters."





LIBERTARIANS: From Whence We Come

Traditionally the word 'libertarian' has been synonymous for 'anarchist,' implying not only opposition to the State but to Capitalism as well. Today the dictionary defines 'libertarian' as 'one who believes in freedom of action and thought, one who believes in free will, [from LIBERTY].'

To quote from the NEXT WHOLE EARTH CATALOG (1980): "Most current users of the term however (particularly those associated with the Libertarian Party), usually champion the notion of minimal government while singing the praise of laissez faire ... It's an ideology with particular appeal for [the] small business [person] and the broad middle class whose pursuit of the American Dream has met increasing obstacles in the last decade."

Libertarianism encompases ideals that have at one time or another been associated with the far right of the Republican Party and the far left of the Democratic Party. Ideals such as: a return to the Gold Standard (abolished by President Nixon in 1972), nonintervention into the internal affairs of other nations. decriminalization of 'victimless crimes', opposition to forced government servitude, pro-civil liberties, and opposition to government interference in the business and personal lives and affairs of people (so long as these individuals do not interfere with the rights of others through the use of force, fraud or intimidation). Today the goal of the Libertarian Movement in South Carolina is Peace, Prosperity, Freedom, and Justice. South Carolina: Freedom was the original idea. - J.B. Heaton

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE UNDERWAY



By the end of October, 18
Presidential candidates representing
17 different political parties had
qualified for the general election
ballot in various states throughout
the country and D.C. In 1980, 21
candidates were on the ballot.

The Democrats and Republicans were on the ballot in all fifty states, next came the Libertarians with ballot status in 39, plus D.C., then the Citizens Party, and trailing were the Communist, Socialist and Populist Parties.
