FROM THE CHAIR



Greetings to you from the South Carolina Libertarian Party. We wish to thank those of you who have supported us through the year. Our memberhip total has increased and the "hits" on our website have remained steady. We have new members who are young college students that are beginning Libertarian Party clubs on their campuses. Judging of the high school essay contest submittals is now under way. We are on the move as the alternative to the other political parties who don't give a hoot about freedom and personal responsibility and believe that less government means lower increases in yearly government spending instead of actual spending reductions.

I believe that it is imperative that for the November 1998 election, we nominate a candidate for governor.Our current governor has presided over a legislature that has increased state spending by almost \$300 million from 96-97 while saying he's a "conservative." He has turned the Department of Revenue from a tax collection service into a bureaucracy that terrorizes the business people of our state with endless paperwork, that files suit to try to outlaw video poker machines, and levies fines of up to \$5,000 on, of all things, charitable bingo halls for incorrect microphone anouncements. Whatever Happened to "Every Man a Lawyer"? Freeing the Legal System

Pro Se means "on one's own behalf." Representing oneself in court used to be a time-honored American tradition and is still a constitutional right of everyone. Of course, anyone who has had a "run in" with the law lately, or tried to file a pro se action in civil court only to be told by a supercilious clerk that "you need a lawyer to do that" knows that this constitutional right, as well as so many others, is rapidly being eroded to the point of non existence. If this enslavement of our legal system continues, a libertarian society becomes a total impossibility.

The Liberty Activists suggest that it is up to Liberty Activists throughout America, in our own communities, to take whatever steps necessary to bring this problem to public attention and begin to "free our legal system". As with many issues, the average American has absolutely no idea of the problem (unless he has been involved recently in a legal action), and, even then, he probably believes that this is the way the system has always worked...and is supposed to work.

THIS IS NOT SO!

"Almost 400 years ago, the great American democratic experiment began.
Almost from the first day--and despite the contrary views of a succession of English monarchs--it assumed that an educated citizenry had no need of lawyers to write its laws or solve its disputes.

Historian Eldon Revere James found that between 1687 and 1788, not a single legal treatise intended for lawyers was published in America. During that period, all the legal treatises were for laymen.

The strong tradition that each American

should be able to master the laws probably peaked in the years between Andrew Jackson's inauguration in 1825 and Abraham Lincoln's death in 1865. Most states enforced few if any restrictions on non-lawyers appearing in court on behalf of others--as Lincoln himself did before he talked a judge into granting him attorney status.

Given America's long tradition of discouraging lawyers, it's surprising that in the 20th century the legal profession so successfully sold Americans on its favorite public relations slogan, "A man who represents himself has a fool for a client." And it's evenmore surprising that without great opposition, the American Bar Association convinced states to pass "unauthorized practice of law" statutes in the 1920s and 1930s, which effectively gave lawyers a monopoly over the sale of legal information.

It is less surprising--at least to everyone who isn't an attorney--that in the last two decades many Americans--battered women, small businesspeople, landlords, inventors and disenfranchised fathers, to mention just a few--have begun to assert their historical and constitutional right to participate in the legal decisions that affect their lives." The Catastrophe of the American Education System

And the Libertarian Solution

I think we can all agree that the current public education system in America is in deep trouble. Our nation spends an average of more than \$5,000 per student, per year in public schools. When added up, the total government expenditures for public education come to more than \$300.0 Billion a year (World Almanac 1997).

Would you say that the schools are better off as a result? As someone who has talked with teachers & students, and, once attended public schools, I know I wouldn't. In public schools we have a 30% dropout rate, a 20% pregnancy rate, widespread student apathy, rising rates of gang violence and falling test scores. Many schools are also overcrowded, filled way past their full capacity. Sure, there are exceptions in many students and many schools. However, the overall situation is grim.

It is my belief that the government no longer cares about education. If they did, they would have taken action by now. The government bureaucracy is not being held accountable for their actions, such as allowing buildings to deteriorate. They are also not being held accountable for the experiments they perform on children, such as Outcome Based

Education (OBE). They have no solid proof that OBE is a more effective way of teaching, yet they have wasted no time in putting it in the system. They have also wasted no time with the enforcement of a program known as "values clarification". In short, values clarification is basically the brainwashing of a child.

The Libertarian Party would like to change all of this. Libertarians are frustrated with the current system and believe that privatization is the best answer. The government has messed the schools up enough and it's time for the parents and teachers to take back the control that is rightfully theirs. The Libertarian belief is that the government should not have a monopoly, nor should they have any control over the educational system. We believe that parents and teachers have become frustrated in dealing with a government bureaucracy that puts a right- or left-wing educational agenda ahead of educating our children.

Private schools have an incentive and motive for providing children with the best education to which they are capable. They know that parents have other options and can take their business elsewhere. Private education is also less expensive. Many private schools operate on a budget that is half | James. (Charleston SCLP Member) that of public schools.

Think of education as a commodity. When you go to a place of business, such as a grocery store, and you are unpleased with the selection or quality, what do you do? In the current free-market system, you go to another store, and hope the last one changes its ways to stay in business. If grocery stores were run like the public education system, you would probably be forced to shop at the slipshod store regardless of dissatisfaction, or you might be allowed to go to a store across town but run by the same people in the same shoddy manner. If you went to a quality store run by others, you would still be forced to subsidize the slipshod store.

This is very frustrating and I believe this is how many parents believe they are being treated. Parents and their children deserve better. They deserve to choose and have the benefits that the free-market can give them. I do not see any reason that they should settle for a government handout. Education has a tremendous influence on the probability of someone succeeding in the world.

Education is the last thing that should be treated as a handout.
