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## Election 2009 Has Already Begun

When one election ends, the next one has already begun. Libertarian candidates are already starting to run for local offices being contested in 2009.

Now is the time for Libertarians to start campaigning to win elections as soon as next spring. The Libertarian Party is launching Operation ELECT-US, aimed at running as many candidates as possible for winnable local races now.

Another 21 Libertarians were elected to local office across

the country in November, bringing our total number of Libertarians in office to 206. You can help increase that number!

If you want to win, it's time to get busy. Most people vote for whom they would prefer as their next door neighbor, and that is no more true than in local elections. Get involved in your community so that your neighbors can get to know you. Start showing up to council meetings, not only so you can become familiar with the issues but even more importantly, so others can become familiar with you and your Libertarian solutions to local problems.

Muir Boda isn't waiting to

recover from this election. Boda has already filed for his City Council seat in Salisbury, MD. Filing in Maryland closes on January 20, 2009, with primary elections being held in March.

The campaign has "gotten off to an incredible start," reports Boda. "Tuesday (the day of the election) I received a call from the *Daily Times* here in Salisbury and gave my first-ever political interview. It went very well and clearly states in the article I am a Libertarian, even though it is a non-partisan race."

## 2008 ELECTION RECAP

As I recover from Election Day and my US Senate campaign that preceded it, it is time to take stock of where the Libertarian Party stands and what we accomplished in the election season just passed.

While I know that we are disappointed that more of our candidates did not win, and that the Barr/Root presidential ticket and our other candidates did not win as many votes as most of us thought they would get, there is much that we gained in 2008 and a lot to be proud of for the Libertarian Party.

First, I think Bob Barr and Wayne Allyn Root were outstanding candidates that represented the ideas of individual liberty in an exemplary manner. There was not a single time that I saw them on television or looked at their Web sites where my reaction wasn't, "Right on!" They represented our message of individual liberty and responsibility in an outstanding fashion, and I want to thank them for that. I also have per-

sonal knowledge of knowing how diligently the campaign staff worked—Russ Verney, Shane Cory, Mike Ferguson, Andrew Davis (on loan from LPHQ) and others. Thank you for dedication to the effort in the face of many challenges that were outside the control of any of us.

Two of our candidates for office earned over 1,000,000 votes. First is John Monds, who ran for Public Service Commission, District 1, in Georgia. His was a two-way statewide race (even though he going to represent a particular district). Also, William Bryan Strange polled a seven-digit number of votes for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 9, in Texas, in another two-way statewide election.

And, speaking of Georgia, our US Senate candidate in the Peach State, Allen Buckley, forced a nationally publicized runoff election between the two major party candidates. Also, Brandon Givens, Public Service Commission, District 4 in Georgia, forced a runoff election for the major party candidates for that office.

We came out of the 2008 election with ballot access for the presidential ticket in 27 states—the same number as at the end of the 2004—and more than any other minor party. However, one of

those states that we gained was North Carolina, where Duke University professor Michael Munger earned nearly 3 percent of the vote for Governor, qualifying the Libertarian Party of North Carolina for the ballot for the next four years. That alone will save the LP about \$200,000 in ballot access expenses—not to mention that it will allow more LP candidates to run for office over that period. We also achieved major party ballot status in Massachusetts, while we lost it in South Dakota.

Even though some people reregistered Republican to vote for Ron Paul in the presidential primaries, the number of voters registered LP nonetheless increased from 225,229 in February 2008 to 243,293 in October 2008. (Those numbers are from the 23 states that allow voters to register Libertarian and that report shows those numbers.)

The sustaining membership (those giving at least \$25 over the past year) of the LP also increased; it is up over 22 percent from this time last year.

There is indisputably much that was accomplished this year for which we can all be proud.

However, our victories in 2008 notwithstanding, the work of the Libertarian Party never ends. The battle for ballot access begins as soon as it ends, and we have no time to waste to keep the

ball rolling. With ballot access, we need to do as much as we can, as soon as we can—to get it done and to get it done as efficiently as possible. Last minute fire drills greatly increase petitioning costs and risk not making the ballot at all.

How can you help with ballot access? First, donate to the Libertarian Party. You can do this at <https://www.lp.org/contribute>, or mail your donation to the Libertarian Party at the address noted on the front page of this newspaper. Your contribution of \$25, \$50, \$100 or \$1,000 will be used to begin the next cycle of ballot drives as absolutely and as soon as possible.

Also, please sign up for email announcements at LP.org to stay up to date on our ballot access projects. Even if you cannot help fund our drives with a donation, we could use your volunteer efforts to help collecting signatures where these drives will occur. Every volunteer signature means one less paid signature, and the savings add up.

Thank you for all your support of our candidates in 2008. Because of your efforts, the candidates of the Libertarian Party received more than 13 million votes! This is a record for the Party, and it is all due to our wonderful donors, volunteers and candidates across the country. I emphatically thank you all.

while changing public policy in a Libertarian direction on the issues which affect people the most in their daily lives. National issues get all the headlines, but in most cases it is local officials who are responsible for fixing your potholes, picking up your trash, providing clean water, and the other necessities of daily life delivered by government.

While the issues may be different, the same Libertarian principles apply. For his part, Boda

says, "I will be focusing on keeping taxes low."

"I will also zero in on some spending practices," states Boda. "(The current council) thinks because money has been allocated or budgeted, they must spend it. This is a wasteful and ridiculous practice."

Not only is running for local office the most effective way of putting Libertarian ideas into practice, it's a lot of fun too. After filing, Boda reports, "I had very positive feedback at work today and voices of support from co-workers who were excited, and from customers who saw my picture in [the] paper."

Maryland is not the only state where filing for office happens soon. For example, filing for local office takes place in Kansas in January as well.

The Kansas Libertarian Party is using these elections to help grow their party. Kansas state Chair Rob Hodgkinson says, "We are making progress getting the message out that the Libertarian Party is not a protest vote but a good vote. This election showed that we need to concentrate on lower level races so we can start winning and take that success to higher levels as we grow."

Operation ELECT-US has already generated 238 inquiries from people who want to run for office as a Libertarian in 2009 or 2010. The national party is working with people in each state to follow up with these prospects and prepare them to get on the ballot and run effective campaigns.

As Hodgkinson says, winning local offices is the stepping stone to winning state and even federal ones. People tend to vote for the person they know the best, and their impressions of our party invariably are based upon how they feel about the first Libertarian they met. Running for local office gives you the opportunity to be that person and put a human face on our ideas.

Serving in local office also gives you a leg up on the next election. If people like what you do on your City Council, they'll be more inclined to want you to do more as their State Representative or Congressman.

You can change public policy in a Libertarian direction by running for a local office now. These races are winnable, but win or lose you will put the Libertarian agenda at the front of the debate on local politics.

### GEORGIA

#### Georgia Libertarians Make History

The Libertarian Party of Georgia had a tremendous Election Day 2008. Even though we did not win any races (check back in 2010), we accomplished three feats.

1) Our US Senate candidate, Allen Buckley, got the right 3.4 percent of the vote -- he has forced a runoff election. Neither incumbent Republican Saxby Chambliss nor his Democrat opponent Jim Martin received a majority of votes cast. Because of their Senate losses in other states, the Republicans are especially nervous about this.

2) Our Public Service Com-

mission candidate from District 4, Brandon Givens, got 5 percent and forced a runoff between the old party contenders.

3) Our other Public Service Commission candidate from District 1 is John Monds. You will be hearing his name a lot in the next two years. John Monds got one-third of the vote in his two-way race with the incumbent Republican -- an all-time high for Georgia Libertarians. On top of that, Mr. Monds received over 1,072,000 votes -- the most votes ANY Libertarian candidate has EVER received ANYWHERE, in ANY RACE. That's more than the nationwide vote totals for any of our Presidential campaigns!

Two runoffs and more than 1,072,000 votes. The old parties in Georgia have been served!

### FLORIDA

#### Libertarian Victories in Local Elections

Libertarians in Florida have had at least six victories in Tuesday's local elections, according to Florida Liberty, a newsgroup that monitors Florida Libertarian affairs.

"Libertarians advocate protection of human rights through voluntary alternatives to government compulsion and have been growing in influence, numbers, and people in offices in Florida," said Julie Chorgo, who edits the group.

Chorgo, who is a Libertarian in public office, also said Libertarians were happy with the passage of several tax reduction initiatives that they had previously backed. In addition, many Libertarians were pleased that nearly 40 percent of the voters had voted against a ban on civil unions. A few years ago people had never heard of the idea, and now support is growing for the concept of keeping government out of personal affairs.

The human rights activists, not all of who belong to the Florida Libertarian Party, were elected in the last year to a variety of posts. These included several countywide Soil and Water Board commissions, a hospital district, and Florida's first Libertarian mayor. Typically they will be focusing on areas of transparency, service improvement at less cost, and areas where private groups' can do the job. Many serve or have served on appointive advisory boards in areas of ballot improvement, cable TV service, and recreational facilities, according to the Libertarian Party of Florida ([www.lpf.org](http://www.lpf.org)) Web site, which also notes a past economic advisor to the Governor.

Libertarians began to take off in Florida after leading a coalition that created an initiative process, then using it over three decades in creating a coalition and winning what newspa-

pers called an epic battle in 1999 on ballot equity. The Libertarians have grown from five to over 40 people in office, and with regular lobbying and participation in many coalitions, including a role in diminishing Florida's notorious ballot problems.

Libertarian groups exist in many countries, including a budding Libertarian Party in the UK and one in Costa Rica that have several legislators in office.

### INDIANA

#### LPIN Works for Success

The Libertarian Party of Indiana would like to thank all of those who ran as candidates. Their hard work has brought greater vote totals and legitimacy and has grown the party significantly. We would also like to thank those who have helped our candidates. Running for office with no staff, little money, and few volunteers is a difficult task. When Libertarians stand up to help other Libertarians in their bid for office, it can be a richly rewarding experience for all. Thank you to those who gave their time and money to our candidates.

Above all, thank you to those who voted for any of the LPIN candidates. We hope you will continue to support liberty in this way.

The LPIN had an impressive year in 2008. All corners of the state had significant gains despite the heaviest straight-ticket voting in recent memory. We competed and grew in an environment where the Big Two spent \$5.3 billion to spread their messages. These numbers speak to the LPIN's significant growth, and the public's continuing desire for a third, liberty-minded option. Here is a snapshot of some of the LPIN's accomplishments in 2008 as of October 7, 2008:

of Indiana's Federal candidates won a total of 70,673 votes. This year, the LPIN had six candidates. In 2000, the LPIN fielded 11 Federal candidates, with a total of 59,188 votes (excluding that year's Senate race.)

This year, the LPIN had 14 state-level candidates. They received a total of 84,047 votes. In 2000, the LPIN fielded 37 candidates, with a vote total of 80,574. This is a tremendous number, and speaks to the need to field a record number of state-level candidates in 2010.

In 2000, Harry Browne won 15,530. In 2008, Bob Barr won 25,358 votes. Indiana is the ONLY state that gave over 1 percent of their vote to the Barr/Root ticket.

In 2000, Andy Horning earned 38,458 votes. In 2008, Andy won 47,257 votes.

Now some numbers and facts from our individual campaigns:

In 2002, Rex Bell was only the second person to win a precinct in the history of the Libertarian Party

of Indiana. Wayne County has added some new names to that honor this year:

Rex Bell, District 54 candidate, won eight precincts, (six in Wayne County, two in Henry County) polling as high as 64 percent. In the District 54 race, Wayne County percentages increased from 23 percent in 2006, to 37 percent this year. In the same race, Henry County percentages increased from 9 percent in 2006, to 32 percent this year. Overall, he took 33.5 percent of the vote in his race.

Cheryl Heacox, Wayne County Commissioner District 2 candidate, won a precinct, and finished second in five others.

Jon Bell, District 56 candidate, won a precinct in a heavily gerrymandered Democratic district, and finished with over 20 percent of the vote.

Gayle Bond, Wayne County Commissioner District three candidate, made a strong showing, finishing with over 40 percent in five precincts.

Wayne County Council can-

didates Jim Mikesell and Marvin Heacox made a good showing, finishing in double digits in several precincts.

In Madison County, Robert Jozwiak ran an energetic race for the House District 37, a heavily gerrymandered Democratic district. A Libertarian has never run in the district and Jozwiak earned 1,197 votes, or 4.42 percent of the vote. Another first-time candidate was Ryan Liedtky in Northern Indiana. Marshall is an unaffiliated county with three Libertarians that meet once a month. Liedtky is the first Libertarian to run in the Republican-run county. He knocked on over 500 doors in his bid for election to the Marshall County Council. He earned 1,762 votes, or 3.59 percent of the vote against three Republicans and three Democrats.

In Hendricks County, both Michele Colson and Todd Singer received over 19 percent of the vote in our bid for Hendricks County Commissioner.

In Southern Indiana, Eric Schansberg was in a highly contested race. Schansberg's opponents both had a collective war chest of \$3 million. Despite this, Schansberg increased his vote totals by 2,000 votes. Schansberg's campaign raised an impressive \$30,000.

In Marion County Ed Angleton ran a two-way race with a beloved Democrat and finished with 15.8 percent of the vote. Ed knocked on countless doors, talked with residents of the district one to two hours a night. Ed wore out a pair of shoes, and one of his knees. He raised \$4,500 from friends and neighbors and put out a mailer that impressed local Democrats, Republicans, and members of the media.

In State Senate District 30, Steve Keltner managed to make a 16-year incumbent work to earn votes for the first time. Steve ran an ag-

gressive campaign for two years that rivaled his opponents in the last days of the campaign. Steve raised over \$10,000 and used \$6,000 for TV ads the last few days of the campaign. Steve won 7.2 percent of the vote.

Even the LPIN paper candidates saw a dramatic increase, with most averaging 5 percent in their races.

As you know, we have hired an Executive Director, Chris Spangle, within the last month. He has already begun to coordinate our 2010 elections. Our ballot access race is for the Secretary of State. If we achieve 2 percent we are considered a minor political party, which is our current status. We will remain on the ballot. BUT I believe our ideas deserve major party status, which is 10 percent. This is our aim in the coming two years.

There are some ways you can help:

The money will be used for preparation for the Secretary of State race and other Libertarian Candidates. These preparations include organizing county organizations, organizing College Libertarian groups, and recruiting candidates. These activities cost our new Executive Director a lot of gas money! Please support our 2010 campaigns by signing up today. There is no minimum. We suggest \$10, \$20, or \$30 a month. That is a dollar or less a day to support liberty in Indiana! 3. Consider running for office. A successful, active campaign should start today. Contact Chris Spangle if this is something you would like to explore. It is not a coincidence that the areas that run consistent, active campaigns have the strongest county organizations. Statehouse candidates will also be instrumental in achieving a higher vote total in the Secretary of State race.

### TEXAS

Texas Libertarians Break Records Yet Again

The Libertarian Party of Texas (LPT) showed strong results in the 2008 general election. The party broke several of its own records and played “kingmaker” in several key races. The party had 173 candidates on the ballot, its highest count ever.

By getting more than 5 percent in at least one statewide race, the LPT is automatically qualified for ballot access in 2010.

William B. Strange, the Libertarian candidate for Court of Criminal Appeals Place 9, received more than one million votes. That is the first time any Libertarian in Texas has crossed the million-vote threshold.

According to ballot-access expert, Richard Winger, Strange is one of only two minor-party candidates to cross the million-vote threshold since 1970.

Yvonne Schick, the Libertarian candidate for U.S. Senator, received over 184,000 votes, or 2.34 percent. That is the highest vote count and the highest per-

centage ever received by a Texas Libertarian for that office.

Libertarian candidates played “kingmaker” in several legislative races. In State Senate District 10, State House District 11, State House District 52, State House District 105, it appears that candidates will win with less than 50 percent of the vote. The Libertarian presence may have been crucial in those races.

Earlier this year, current and former Republican officeholders had contacted several Libertarian candidates asking them to drop out of the election.

In Travis County, two Libertarian candidates played “kingmaker”, holding the winners under 50 percent, and possibly costing two Republican incumbents their seats.

Wes Benedict, LPT Executive Director, commented, “I’m glad to see that we might throw the election to the Democrat in District 105. If Republicans lose control of the Texas House, that

could be a good thing for taxpayers. Government generally grows much faster when the same party controls both the legislative and executive branches. Divided government might be healthy for Texas.”

### OHIO

#### Elections Revitalize the LPO

The excitement of the election has paved the way for renewed interest in the LPO. Our membership (national sustaining level) has increased by 24 percent since April. Ohio continues to be the fourth largest national LP affiliate in sustaining membership.

The national election did not meet our expectations (the “bar” was raised quite a bit from previous elections), but the vote total for Mr. Barr was 27 percent higher than for Mr. Badnarik in 2004. This compares with the national average of a 23 percent increase compared to 2004. The Ohio LP

did much better in Congressional and Ohio legislature battles. Our percentage of votes was in the 3 to 8 percent range. In fact, we already have candidates talking about running again in 2010.

The Central Committee has been created to oversee the overall Ohio Party. Luke McKellar is the chairman of the Central Committee. Their first order of business was to elect an Executive Committee that will run the day-to-day operations. Elected chair of the Executive Committee was Kevin Knedler. The new Executive committee has seven members.

The Ohio party is already at work for 2009, 2010, and beyond. There will be strategic planning meetings to determine the course of action for the Libertarian Party of Ohio.

# WHAT ABOUT AFGHANISTAN?

I want Osama bin Laden dead. I want Al Queda gone. So why do I want us out of Afghanistan?

As a member of the Libertarian Party's national committee (LNC), I represent members of our party. I am sometimes contacted by members who have concerns and want issues addressed. A few months ago I was contacted by party member Susan Hogarth concerning continued presence of our military in Afghanistan.

Understand that it is not the LNC's job to pass resolutions on every subject known to man. We have conventions and adopt a platform. The only merit in presenting a resolution is a timely response to something new that is not addressed in our platform. Following the convention in May, the focus shifted away from Iraq and more towards Afghanistan. Both Obama and McCain support sending more troops, and Bob Barr is sending a message that we need to stop nation building. In the same way the LNC responded last year to the Ron Paul movement with a resolution inviting him to seek our nomination, we considered the changing military and political conditions in the matter of Afghanistan.

The case for Iraq is very clear. Among the many objec-

tions is the lack of connection from Iraq to 9/11. Afghanistan is home to the Taliban, which harbored Al Queda. Shouldn't we be in Afghanistan?

Sending special forces to eliminate terrorists under authorization of Marque and Reprisal is different from sending conventional military to occupy a nation without Constitutional authorization.

I am not a pacifist. Some of you may be, and that's fine. If someone threatens or attacks me, I will employ martial arts skills I learned in Richmond, Virginia to defend myself. I support the right to arm myself with weapons for the same purpose. The same goes for our country. We don't wait for injury in order to retaliate. We use intelligence to assess threats and respond quickly to properly authorize use of force to defend ourselves.

My reasoning may not match yours, but I recognize that continuing an occupation with our military is something we need to do less of, not more. Dr. Ron Paul is right about our foreign policy.

I know that Neal Boortz thinks it is insulting to refer to our troops as occupiers. I admit I like Boortz a lot and listen to him often. No rational person would insult those obeying orders to risk their lives for us. That does not mean we cannot hold politicians accountable for placing these honorable soldiers in the role of

occupying a foreign land and running their country for them.

I do not carry the honor of having served in our military. Admiral Michael Colley does have that honor and I respect his opinion on these matters. As a very distinguished member of our LNC he carries great credibility when he speaks in favor of our non-interventionist foreign policy. As a result of his support along with our other LNC members, we unanimously approved the following resolution on Sept 7, 2008 in Washington DC:

*WHEREAS* the government of the United States should return to its historical libertarian tradition of avoiding entangling alliances, foreign quarrels, and military adventures; and security of Afghanistan lie outside the jurisdiction of the government of the United States; and *WHEREAS* the Libertarian Party recognizes that the only legitimate role of the military is to defend America against direct attack or the imminent threat of attack;

*THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED* that the Libertarian National Committee calls on the government of the United States to withdraw the armed forces of the United States from Afghanistan, without undue delay.
