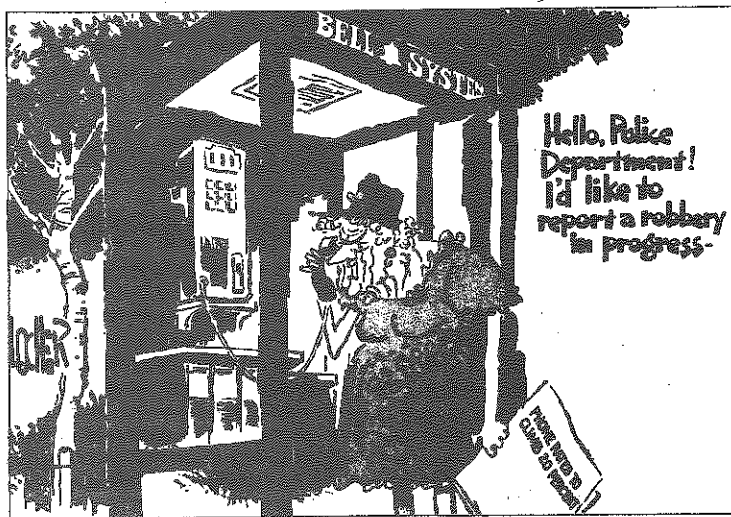

Hypocrisy... And Reagan's Anti-Sex League

You've probably never heard of Marjory Mecklenburg, but she has the toughest job in the Reagan administration. As deputy assistant secretary for population affairs at the Department of Health and Human Services, Mecklenburg has the unenviable task of keeping the nation's teen-agers from going all the way. The so-called Adolescent Family Life Program, which Mecklenburg oversees, is spending \$13.5 million in a determined effort to keep our youth chaste. We have a feeling that many adolescents are still indulging in pleasures of the flesh, but Mecklenburg remains a tireless foe of young lust.

Mecklenburg's legislative mandate is to promote self-discipline and chastity and "to explore family-centered approaches to the problem of adolescent sexual relations and adolescent pregnancy." She pursues these goals by sponsoring a variety of research, counseling and prevention programs. One research project, for which her program shelled out \$78,000, seeks to determine how teen-agers get away with having sex in their homes. Mecklenburg's "prevention" services are aimed at preventing sex, not teen pregnancies. According to a member of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues, "They explain to kids the alternatives, and it's not masturbation, either." (Homework? Video games? Volunteering for the local Young Americans for Freedom chapter?)

Counseling services funded by Mecklenburg downplay contraception and abortion and, instead, push adoption as the only correct moral choice for teen-agers with unwanted pregnancies.

If the so-called squeal rule, which Mecklenburg authored, overcomes a strong legal challenge, teen-age girls who seek contraceptives at federally funded clinics would be promptly reported to their parents. Mecklenburg insists that there is nothing wrong with violating teen-agers' privacy this way and argues that it is perfectly proper for the government to force such confrontations between parents and their children.

But she herself would just as soon keep quiet about those aspects of her personal history that do not conform to her "Little House on the Prairie" moral creed. Back home in Minnesota, where Mecklenburg was an outspoken opponent of abortion rights, sources have revealed to us that the chastity crusader was pregnant before she married her husband, gynecologist Fred Mecklenburg. How does Mecklenburg justify her efforts to impose an official morality on the nation's youth when she herself conceived a child out of wedlock? "No comment," she told *Mother Jones* through her press secretary. "Ms. Mecklenburg does not comment on anything having to do with her personal life. It's a family matter." Unfortunately, Mecklenburg has no such hesitation about commenting on other people's personal affairs.

The Plight Of The South

According to the 1860 census, the South had some 985,000 men 18 to 45 in the free white category. An estimated 1,003,000 served in the Confederate army. The explanation of the discrepancy is not so much the volunteers from border states - after all, many Southerners of both races served in the Union army - as the fact that many Confederate soldiers were under 18, and as the war continued younger and younger boys enlisted. Of these, an estimated 406,000 to 462,000 were casualties (died from wounds or disease, captured, wounded, missing); the lower figure represents an attempt to adjust for those who were wounded and sent home more than once, or wounded sent home and later killed, who might be counted twice. It does not figure wounded in the modern way, however, and so does not count any "minor" wounds that would not cause a soldier to leave his unit for an extended time.

One of the more interesting statistics concerns deaths of POWs; Yankee prisoners in the South lost 8.3% at a time when the Confederate Army and much of the civilian population was on short rations. Furthermore, it must be realized that many of these were captured while wounded (in fact, captured because they were wounded and could not escape), and that many of the deaths were from wounds, not disease or malnutrition. On the other hand, 12% of the Confederate prisoners held in the North died in prison. Their story has never been adequately told.

MORE RESISTERS URGED

Resisting registration is the single most important thing a draft-age man can do to stop the draft, and the foreign intervention and war the draft fosters. I'm proud to have done so. But as one of the sixteen indicted resisters, I felt I must go a step further and also resist the government's efforts to prosecute me.

To avoid prosecution, I went underground. For over a year now since my indictment I have successfully eluded the FBI. There are plenty of good reasons—legal, political and moral reasons—to avoid prosecution, and going underground is the only secure way to avoid prosecution once indicted.

I went underground because I believe I'll certainly be sent to prison if I go to their court. True, today no one is in prison, but Russ Ford, Ed Hasbrouck, and Ben Sasway have spent some time there, and Sasway and Gary Eklund are only free on appeal—they were sentenced to two and a half years and two years respectively.

Vocal political resisters, outside the major media centers, will be convicted and receive prison sentences—especially in the South (I'm from Arkansas), the rural West and Midwest, or military-dominated areas such as San Diego. Granted, we may still win a few victories in the lower courts, but the government will appeal any setback to the Supreme Court and there we'll surely lose.

The Supreme Court, as everyone should know, has ruled in favor of the Selective Service System and conscription over every objection (and there are many). They have already guarded the program with "stays" of negative lower court rulings on the whole registration program (1980) and recently on student aid. With the present Supreme Court on the bench (Terms are for life, of course), going to court is a predetermined failure and an expensive road to prison.

Understandably, the vision of civil disobedience accepted by many attempts to stop a law by overloading the judicial system with law-breakers, but after well over three years of registration and resistance to it, the government has only dared prosecute a select group of sixteen. Sixteen of us can't shut down the legal system and thus there's no point going to court.

I feel resisting prosecution is even more important because the government's prosecution program makes going to court so counterproductive. Strategically, prosecutions have been a premeditated attempt to intimidate (scare) resisters and potential

resisters into the belief that resistance may lead to prison. Disasterously, the government has been highly successful with their "show trials"—many young men I speak with are falsely convinced that a few resisters are now behind bars. I've found 18 year olds about to be paroled from the prison of public school are not going to follow the advice of some guy who just got locked in a real "iron bar" prison.

My trial and certain conviction would only strengthen the perception of young men that people are now in prison for not registering; that they, personally, won't be able to resist without serious penalties. Faced with even a potential prison term (which the relentless flow of warning letters never fail to mention), many register.

If our accepted strategy is non-registration, which it is, then these "many" are the crucial difference between success or failure. It is imperative that we expose the enforcement of draft registration for the monstrous bluff that it is. We can only do this by staying out of court and out of jail.

I'm underground because I want to be free to live my life in my own way. I resisted registration because I have better things to do than kill on command! I also have plans that don't include sitting in a jail cell.

People in the press have asked resisters if they are prepared to go to jail. I'm not prepared to go to prison—prison is unacceptable. Prison is a disgusting sewer that no decent person could ever deserve.

Draft resisters, though men of conscience, will be thrown in the same cells as real criminals. Beatings and homosexual rape are common in prison. During the trial of Enten Eller, a federal judge agreed with a probation officer that if sent to jail Eller would almost certainly be sexually assaulted.

How can a supposedly free country (ha!) take intelligent, peaceful individuals and lock them in cages to be beaten and degraded for the "high crime" of refusing to sign their name on a postcard? And how can a person, aware of this reality, voluntarily place himself in a courtroom? I know I can't.

Lastly, I'm avoiding going to court because I don't want to sanction this legal system. Even if a resister doesn't go underground, he should at least not appear in court voluntarily. Don't let people mistake the courtroom as a place we freely enter for a just decision of the issue.

I wish all resisters success on whatever path they choose to embark, but I strongly advise anyone seriously facing an indictment to go underground to avoid prosecution. Going underground frees the peaceful non-registrant from the grip of an unjust legal system and the undue horror of a brutal prison system. And avoiding prosecution is a clear signal that the choice cannot be limited to registration or prosecution. The government cannot command our lives and liberties at their whim—I'm free.

TAXATION

It was a principle of the Common Law, as it is of the law of nature, and of common sense, that no man can be taxed without his personal consent. The Common Law knew nothing of that system, which now prevails in England, of assuming a man's own consent to be taxed, because some pretended representative, whom he never authorized to act for him, has taken it upon himself to consent that he may be taxed. That is one of the many frauds on the Common Law, and the English constitution, which have been introduced since Magna Carta. Having finally established itself in England, it has been stupidly and servilely copied and submitted to in the United States.

If the trial by jury were reestablished, the Common Law principle of taxation would be reestablished with it; for it is not to be supposed that juries would enforce a tax upon an individual which he had never agreed to pay. Taxation without consent is as plainly robbery, when enforced against one man, as when enforced against millions; and it is not to be imagined that juries could be blind to so self-evident a principle. Taking a man's money without his consent, is also as much robbery, when it is done by millions of men, acting in concert, and calling themselves a government, as when it is done by a single individual, acting on his own responsibility, and calling himself a highwayman. Neither the numbers engaged in the act, nor the different characters they assume as a cover for the act, alter the nature of the act itself.

If the government can take a man's money without his consent, there is no limit to the additional tyranny it may practise upon him; for, with his money, it can hire soldiers to stand over him, keep him in subjection, plunder him at discretion, and kill him if he resists. And governments always will do this, as they everywhere and always have done it, except where the Common Law principle has been established. It is therefore a first principle, a very sine qua non of political freedom, that a man can be taxed only by his personal consent. And the establishment of this principle, with trial by jury, insures freedom of course; because: 1. No man would pay his money unless he had first contracted for such a government as he was willing to support; and, 2. Unless the government then kept itself within the terms of its contract, juries would not enforce the payment of the tax. Besides, the agreement to be taxed would probably be entered into but for a year at a time. If, in that year, the government proved itself either inefficient or tyrannical, to any serious degree, the contract would not be renewed.

Getting Them Young

According to the in-flight magazine of American Airlines: "The Kansas City, Missouri, business community is giving its budding entrepreneurs a head start in a program that teaches basic economic principles to 13,000 school children a year.

"The fifth graders from 22 Kansas City area school districts become capitalists for a day at Exchange City, a simulated town where they take 'jobs' ranging from bank president to disk jockey.

"Before spending a day at Exchange City, school children spend four to six weeks studying economics. Each chooses from the 90 jobs available at the city, fills out an 'application', and has a job 'interview' with his or her teacher. Although the most popular jobs thus far are disk jockey and video-game-store owner, students also choose from less

glamorous roles as factory workers and sales clerks.

"The surprisingly realistic 8,500-square-foot town, located in a warehouse near downtown, has a Greek Revival bank facade and fixtures that really work—from the radio station to the computer in the bank.

"The children take out loans, shop for raw materials that they will then turn into saleable items, pay rent and taxes, sign pay checks, and manage employees. The goal is to run their shops efficiently enough to repay loans and interest at the end of the day.

"It's sink or swim," says Ellen Pittman, program director for Exchange City. "Some of the kids make a profit and can repay the bank loans with which they start the day. Other kids go broke."

And it can happen here should we forget that government is a continual threat to our personal freedom, that only a free market economy is able to withstand such a threat, and that the foundation of the free market economy rests on a private property order.

Limited government becomes an unlimited State through the prostitution of economic principles. Economic education, with a concurrent regeneration of individualism, is the only way to restore a free society and, at the same time, offer a solution to our present grave and dangerous situation.

May it be said that this year of 1984 was the time when we moved away from the 1984 world of Big Brother. It is the duty of us all—who still know freedom—to work toward such an outcome.

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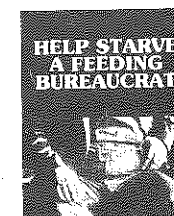

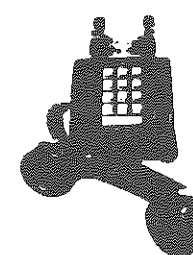


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Taxes Spent, Learning Have No Correlation

There is absolutely no correlation between monies spent and quality of education. All American citizens are aware of this, and it is pure hogwash for the Governor, the lawmakers, the administrators and the teachers in our school system to so adamantly back the one-cent increase in our S.C. sales tax.

Ever since the advent of the integration of our public school system and the subsequent establishment of the federal Department of Education, the knowledge imparted to our young people has plummeted drastically despite the billions and billions of dollars poured into the so-called learning processes. All statistics confirm this conclusion.

Secretary of Education Terrel Bell has released a report showing that New York State, which placed second in per pupil expenditure, finished 25th in achievement test scores. New Hampshire placed No. 1 in achievement scores but only 28th in per pupil expenditures.

South Carolinians should demand the voting records of their representatives on any proposal to increase funding of the school system through more taxation on our already overburdened citizenry.

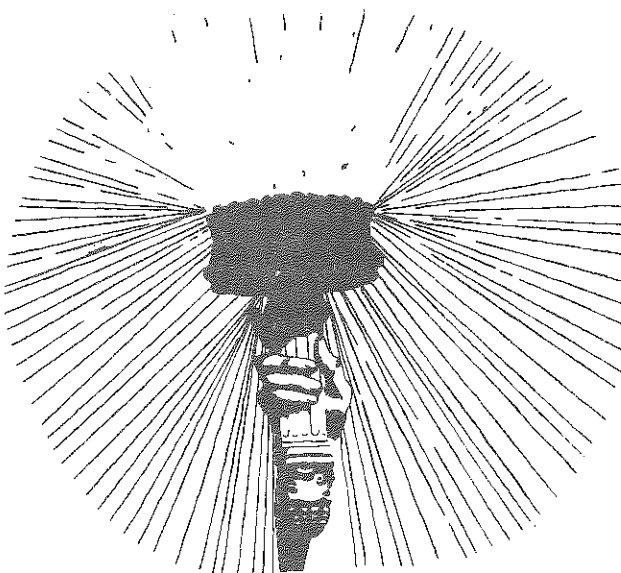
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Punitively Taxed

In its unending quest to tax the citizens of South Carolina to death, the Legislature is now considering an increased tax on beer and wine. Is there no end to this? Let me mention a few items that the proponents of this new exaction have not mentioned:

South Carolina already has the highest beer taxes in the nation.

The increased tax will not cause people to drive to North Carolina to buy beer, because people are already driving to North Carolina to buy beer. This, plus the proposed sales tax increase, will only give them two more reasons to do so. People who live near the North Carolina line buy beer and wine in North Carolina now, unless they live opposite a dry county.

The increase in beer sales in the last 20 years can be partly attributed to the increase in population, and partly to the relative decrease in sales of hard liquor.

The increases in the price of beer have not affected sales much simply because the prices of bread (made from much the same ingredients) and every other necessity of life have gone up as much or more in the last 20 years.

The effectiveness of the state alcohol and drug programs is largely unproven, as there is no way to tell how many of those

helped by the program were in fact dissuaded by the knowledge that a subsequent DUI offense was likely to result in a jail term, and how many by the program itself.

I can find no statistics either way, but my impression is that beer and wine drinkers constitute a minority of DUI offenders; the majority being from liquor, marijuana or other drugs. I merely note that there is no proposal to increase the liquor tax.

Furthermore, a potentially more effective way to decrease DUI offenses, the confiscation of cars of offenders, would adequately fund the drug abuse program, without taxing those who do not drive under the influence. It is unfair to tax the social drinker, who has a glass of wine or beer with supper, to rehabilitate the alcoholic.

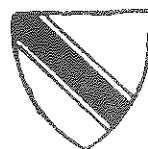

Teachers Erect Cartel

School teacher Larry J. Walters (Public Forum, March 9) asserted that he and his comrades are "underpaid." Last month, a group of teachers applied for a \$19,000 post office janitor job as part of a publicity blitz for a pay raise. All that proved was that federal workers are grossly overpaid in relation to the market for janitors, and it is ironic that manual labor is the only other job most teachers are qualified for.

Aid Private Schools In Educating Poor

Before we spend one more penny (or \$210 million) on public education, this country needs a radical overhaul of the way children are schooled. The fact that ordinary children are learning enough at home or in one-room private schools to attend Ivy League colleges is an embarrassment the state wants to hide from the taxpayers. If Dick Riley was really interested in education, he would not limit his plans to public education.

Since private schools cost half what government schools do, the cost to taxpayers could be reduced simply by giving a tax credit to any person for educating any child. I have no children in school, and would love the opportunity to give my money to a poor child for tuition, rather than pay taxes that feed some fat bureaucrat.

Socialists try to smear private schools as "rich and racist," but 42 percent of the students are from minority backgrounds. The average family income is higher because both parents often work to afford a good education, and the huge wealth of a very few skews the average.

Riley is pandering to the teachers' unions to build a money machine for his next election bid, at the expense of our children. The average teacher scores 58 points below the miserable average on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, ranks in the bottom 9 percent of his freshman college class, earns \$96 a day, and is protected from market competition by phony education credits.

The average S.C. taxpayer earns \$65 a day. Let's open up teaching to engineers, chemists and retired military, and let the private schools have a fair chance at educating the poor.

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Our Lost Art Of Reading

The U.S. Navy says one out of every four of its recent recruits cannot read at the ninth grade level — the minimum needed to understand written safety instructions. At a Westinghouse Electric defense plant not long ago, several workers had to be discharged because their inability to read simple instructions posed a danger to employees' lives.

Such shocking examples abound throughout our public education system, despite the growing demands of today's intensely competitive, high-technology world. "By the simplest tests of everyday reading, writing and comprehension," says the National Commission on Excellence in Education, "some 23 million American adults are functionally illiterate." And, it adds, "about 13 percent of all 17-year-olds in the U.S. can be considered functionally illiterate." The question is, why? In a nation that spends more than \$100 billion a year on education, what's gone wrong? As the National Commission found, "the average graduate of our schools and colleges today is not as well-educated as the average graduate of 25 or 35 years ago..."

Many experts now agree that today's education crisis is due in large part to a down-grading of the basics — reading, writing and arithmetic — in favor of dubious frills, and innovations. According to Samuel Blumenfeld, one of the nation's leading educational authorities, the alarming decline in literacy can be traced to the "look-say" method of teaching American youngsters how to read.

In a newly-published America's Future pamphlet, entitled *The Victims of "Dick and Jane,"* Blumenfeld explains how the traditional alphabetic-phonics method of reading instruction gave way to the "look-say" or whole-word system. Presumably, advocates of the whole-word method intended it as a short-cut in teaching how to read, replacing the old system in which alphabet letters stand for sounds. Unfortunately, the new system hasn't worked. Elementary schools have been turning out youngsters who recognize words but don't know how to read. "You cannot achieve high individual literacy," scolds Blumenfeld, "in a system that numbs the intellect, stifles intelligence, and reduces learning to the level of Mickey Mouse."

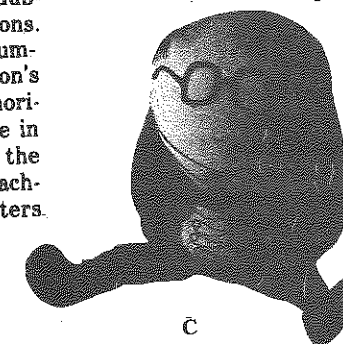

SCE&G Less Efficient Than Whole Economy

My electric and gas bill this month caused some alarm.

In looking back I determined that, in 1973, I used 16,333 KWHs of electricity and 1,039 cubic feet of gas. I paid \$646.05 to S.C. Electric & Gas.

Ten years later, in 1983, after adding insulation, storm doors and windows, with the same house, I used 13,847 KWHs of electricity and 1,139 cubic feet of gas. I switched to a gas hot water heater. The electricity consumption is down 15 percent. Gas is up 9.6 percent. I paid SCE&G \$1,732.33. The bill is up 168 percent.

Curiously, during this same period, the Consumer Price Index has gone up 105 percent. This must mean that SCE&G is at least 63 percent less efficient than the economy as a whole.

Not only does it bear more heavily those who work for a living, it is one reason that their

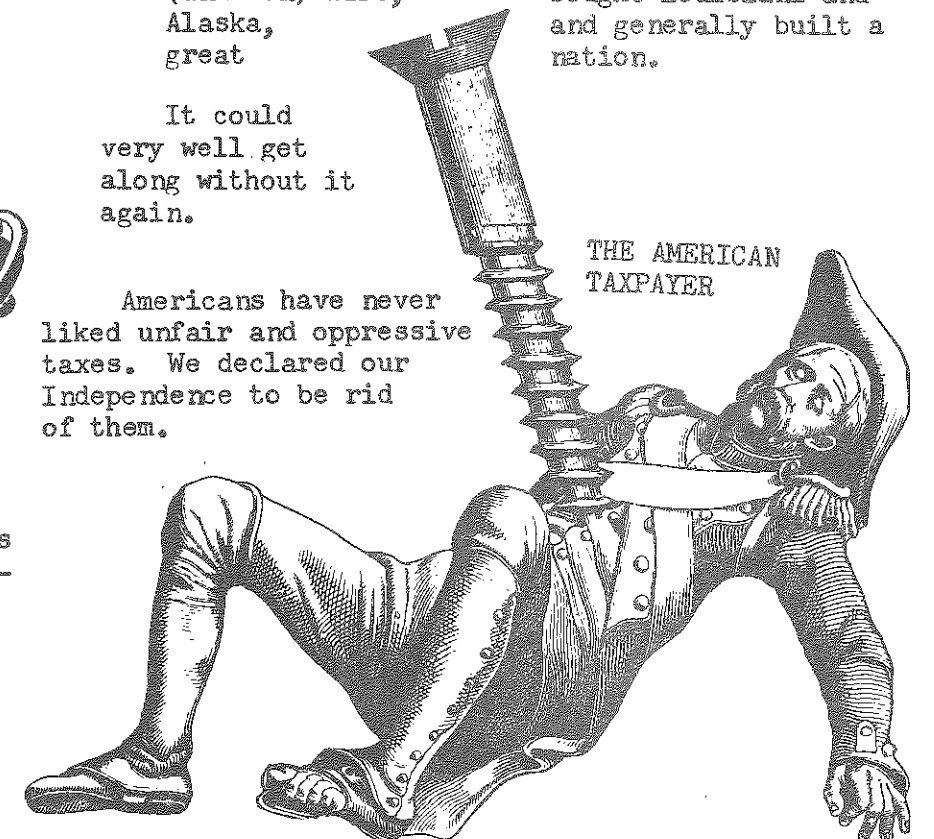
taxes have been increasing, while the rich have actually had a decline in taxes in the last few years.

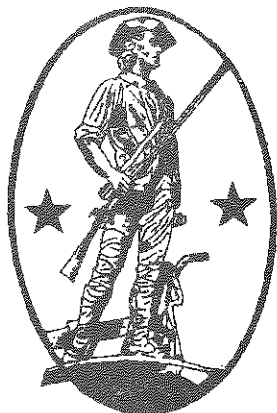
