Libertarian Party Says Good News is the Old News

COLUMBIA, SOUTH CAROLINA—"The Libertarian Party knows that the voice of the future is in the voice of the past. The founding fathers created solutions to most of the problems that we have today and they are clearly stated in the Constitution." said Walter Rolandi, recently appointed SCLP Executive Director. "We are emerging as the honest alternative to the liberal-left versus conservativeright stalemate." said SCLP State Chairman Steve Vandervelde. "People all over America are realizing that the only difference between the Democrats and the Republicans is in the way that they grow government." he added. The Libertarian Party is the third largest political party in the United States and it has recently undergone rapid growth. The party stresses individual responsibility in its emphasis on personal and economic freedom. Its non-violent platform advocates a limited federal government and the privatization of most tax supported services including education, health care and welfare. "We've seen a big surge in interest all over South Carolina. We're very enthusiastic about 1996.", said

Statement of Principles:

SCLP Executive Committee News:

The South Carolina Libertarian Party (SCLP) Executive Committee, in accordance with South Carolina Election Law, is comprised of elected representatives from each organized county LP club, the SCLP Chair & Vice Chair, elected at the SCLP Convention, and the Treasurer and Secretary (non voting members), elected by the Executive Committee, and meets every first Saturday at La Fiesta Mexician Restaurant, Charleston Highway, West Columbia, SC at 2:00 PM.

The Executive Committee discusses party business, receives reports from county clubs, monitors

SCLP expenditures, develops and approves SCLP projects (such as this newsletter). The Executive Committee may, from time to time, appoint adhoc committees or additional officers to carry out projects. Meeting are open to all SCLP members and guests, but only voting members of the Executive Committee may vote.

At its May meeting, the Executive Committee designated Walter Rolandi of Columbia as Executive Director. Walter will be responsible for developing projects and raising funds, serve as a spokesperson for the SCLP, and will report to the Executive Committee.

County Happenings Aiken County:

The Aiken Co. LP holds regular monthly meetings on first Thursdays at 7:00 PM at The Buffet Restaurant, University Pkwy, Aiken. The topics for each meeting are published in the Aiken Standard (and sometimes the Augusta Chronicle!) Videos on various subjects are often shown. In

early June, due to the renewed interest in Waco following the Oklahoma bombing. the ACLP will again sponsor showings of the Waco, the Big Lie videos (1 and 2) at an Aiken Community center. The ACLP is also placing copies of the Waco videos in local video stores for free rental, and continuing to distribute the SCLP "Right to Bear Arms" brochures. and our local government is trying to grow even faster than the population. This area needs a Libertarian perspective." Don Cooler, a retired engineer who has been interested in local politics for some time agrees. "Does Beaufort County really need bureaucracies that merely duplicate state and federal ones? I don't think so and I don't think the voters will stand for it much longer."

Beatrice Jones of Hardeeville is preparing a campaign for the state house. Her district has been represented by a liberal Democrat for some years, but Bea says it's time for a change. She feels that a platform based on education reform will appeal to all of the voters.

The organization is also looking into the "Adopt-a-Highway" program as a public service activity. According to Robert Hutka, "This will let the public know we're here. It will also emphasize our party's position on voluntary community service as opposed to government solutions."

Charleston County: Elections 1994: John Altman Wins 12.7% in Three-Way, County-Wide, Partisan Race

The most visible Libertarian campaign in Charleston County was for County Council. John Graham Altman III ran for the West Ashley seat. John had excellent name recognition because his father serves on the Charleston County School Board. Even so, the race was tough. It was a partisan, county-wide race. John's apponents were Republican, Mike Smith and Democrat, Rob Wendt. Altman recieved over 8,000

How can the LP win? Jim Sims points the way.

Jim Sims ran for the James Island Constituent School board. Jim had five apponents with voters choosing the top three. Jim came in fourth with 13.3% of the votes, equivlant to almost 40% of the votes in a single member district. This showing indicates we have a better chance of winning multi-member districts than single representative districts, especially if the candidate is not a well known member of the community.

LP Recieves Advertising Courtesy of Democrat

Robert Pain, running against Republican Mark Sanford and Democrat Robert Barber, garnered 1,763 votes in the U.S, Congressional race. The race also showed the Democrates support of tax laws and laws for victimless crimes.

Early in the race, Robert challenged his opponents to sign a pledge against tax increases. Republican Sanford signed while Democrat Barber waffled.

Late in the race, Barber used the fact of Sanford's signing the "Libertarian Pledged against tax Increases" as "proof" Sanford would sign anything. What it did though was publicize the LP name and its opposition to taxes and laws defining victimless crimes. Thank you Mr. Barber!

1995 Tax Protest

Libertarians protested taxes at the downtown Charleston Branch of the Post Office on April 19, 1995.

Motorists honked away when they saw the "Honk if You Hate Taxes" pickett signs. The "Million Dollar Bill" handouts proved quite popular with pedistrian traffic. Theprotest appeared in the background of a local news report and a picture appeared in the "post and Couriour" on April 20, 1995.

Other County News:

Doc Quillian of the Horry Co. LP reports that the 2nd Amendment Day info was mailed to his member list. Doc also says Myrtle Beach LP'ers will soon begin meeting again...call him for details. In the Midlands, the Lexington and Richland county LP clubs meet jointly the 2nd Thursday each month. Midlands LP members were active this spring in lobbying for the "Taxpayers Plan" (aka the "Miles Plan") which would have eliminated property taxes, cut state spending and capped spending without adding other taxes. Unfortunately, this plan was unsuccessful, but the Midlands LP'ers learned a lot about legislative lobbying and made new contacts amongs the tax protest groups, according the Chair Mark Johnson. In Anderson county, LP county organizer Doug Taylor writes "Thank you for your work on the 2nd Amendment Day ideas packet. I got more feedback from your flyers than anything I have ever done." Update on Greene Case:

A Petition for Rehearing in the Greene election case was filed with the U.S. Supreme Court December 22,1994. "This is the last step in the appeal process," noted James Leslie, Jr., Greene's attorney, "although we would not be precluded from filing the case in Federal Court through the end of the term of office Greene would have served." Doug Greene, the Libertarian Party candidate in Aiken County Council District 4 race in April 1992, lost by 5

votes to the incumbent Democrat. Greene appealed election irregularities in not allowing incorrectly listed voters the right to vote challenge ballots, thus costing him the election to the County & State Election Commission and the S.C. Supreme Court. The S.C. Supreme Court found that although Greene was correct that the law had not been followed, the legislature didn't really intend the law to say what it did, and denied his complaint. Greene then appealed the the U.S. Supreme Court, which denied "cert" (refused to hear the case) in December 1994. The Petition for Rehearing was then filed. As of this date, no answer has been received. This case is very important for Libertarians as it shows how easy it is for those who run the election system to manipulate the results of a close election, and how the election commissions and even the court system works in favor of those in power.

If your local BBS does **not** yet carry SC_Lib, but carries other FIDO echos such as SC_Net, the SysOp can pick up SC_Lib feed through FIDO Hub 18 (or call Mel Minitor at RFR for assistance).Local BBS's on FIDO can also pick up LIBERTY, the FIDO echo of Libernet.

Most local BBS's are run by computer buffs out of their homes, and do not have an access charge (or a very modest one). BBS's carry different conferences where you can post messages and communicate with others throughout the country, as well as myriad files (computer Shareware programs) and games which you can download for free or very low cost. Many local BBS's have Internet access, if you want to try surfing the Internet, and some have private E-mail functions (just like the commercial on line services). Each BBS is slightly different, but all have a Main Board, which gives you choices of different areas, such as Messages, Files, Games etc. Pick the area you want and follow the BBS instructions on how to read, respond etc. If you need help, there should be an online Help screen, or, you can page the SysOp (System Operator) and ask for help.




