With the steady erosion of our liberty, people should take stock and examine what is at the core of this trend — the principle of "community standards."

I challenge any constitutional scholar to show where in the U.S. Constitution community standards are mentioned. I don't believe any scholar can, because this principle is a pure invention of the supposed protector of the Constitution, the Supreme Court.

The truth is, the Bill of Rights protects us from community standards. According to the First Amendment, a person has the right to worship as he pleases, even if his religion is not that of the majority of the community. If a person has ideas different from or even anathema to those of the community, he has a right to express them. In fact, the entire Bill of Rights is basically a list of individual rights protecting us from the whim of the majority.

Democracy without individual rights is meaningless. Socrates found this out when he was, quite democratically, executed for the crime of "impiety." What was impiety? Why, whatever the Athenian people said it was. Sound familiar? This is very similar to the way the "community" defines "obscenity" in our society.

Democracy without individual rights can be just as tyrannical as the most brutal dictatorship.

Bureaucracy causes education's problems

WASHINGTON -Education in America is failing because liberals have allowed rapacious education bureaucracies to rip off both taxpayer and student.

Unable to hide the failure, education's spokesmen blame "tight budgets" and "inadequate funding." Yet the U.S. spends more on education than the gross national product of Scandinavia (Sweden, Norway and Denmark combined)

U.S. educational spending is as large as the combined gross national products of Belgium and the Netherlands; it is 40 percent of the gross national product of France and 64 percent of the gross national product of Canada.

The problem of American education is not money, but accountability.

In a new book, Brookings Institution economist John E. Chubb and Stanford professor Terry M. Moe concluded that government has not solved the education problem because government is the problem.

Chubb says: "The public education system functions naturally and routinely, despite cveryone's best intentions, to burden schools with excessive bureaucracy, to discourage effective school organization and to stifle student achievement.

'Efforts to improve schools are therefore doomed unless they eliminate or sharply curtail the influence of the institutions that cause the schools' problems in the first place."

This conclusion by two liberal scholars supports the position reached by many conservatives as well as by black politicians such as Wisconsin state Rep. Polly Williams from Milwaukee. Representative Williams has learned from her experience and that of her constituents that government programs prevent people from making choices that would improve their

She got a bill passed that will divert money

from the state's education budget to provide vouchers for students to attend private schools. Her plan would deprive the public schools of captive students and force the schools to improve their product or lose their customers. Instead of accepting this challenge to improve itself, the school system is throwing up every roadblock imaginable and is suing in court to stop the voucher plan.

Public education is failing because it was turned over to "experts" and insulated from influence and control by parents, principals and teachers in the classroom.

Representative Williams says: "Our liberal friends have built their whole lives around taking care of us and they still want to feed us with Pablum. At some point, we want real food. We want to make our own decisions whether our liberal friends like it or not."

This is heresy to an entrenched poverty industry determined to maintain the status quo regardless of its effectiveness. But without vouchers to enforce competition, school systems will continue to be run for the benefit and convenience of administrators and bureaucrats.

Bureaucratization and some civil rights policies such as busing destroyed neighborhood schools that were accountable to parents and competed to produce the most successful students. The only way the public can regain control over public education is through vouchers.

Chubb says: "Nothing in the concept of democracy requires that schools be subject to direct control by school boards, superintendents, central offices, departments of education and other arms of government. Nor does anything in the concept of public education require that schools be governed in this way. There are many paths to democracy and public education. The path America has long been treading is exacting a heavy price - one the nation and its children can ill afford to bear ...

NEW YORK (RNS) - Several American Jewish leaders have charged Archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa with being insensitive for having urged Jews, during his recent visit to Israel, to pray for the perpetrators of the Nazi Holocaust.

Despite this abysmal record, the manager of U.M.'s Housing Security Services, Joel Allan, doesn't believe there is much point in prosecuting offending students under the law.





Paris demo targets immigration laws


PARIS - Over 100 AIDS activists protested restrictive U.S. immigration laws March 3 as ACT UP/Paris held its largest demonstration to date. According to the group's announcement of the event, "Nobody was arrested — to everybody's surprise."

The demonstration began in front of the U.S. Embassy on the Place de la Concorde, 🐔 where protesters burned a U.S. flag. The activists then marched up rue Royale, blocking the street, as they made their way to Place de la Madeleine, where they staged a die-in. Van loads of police were on hand, but no trouble between police and protesters was reported. The event was widely covered by local television stations.

- Q. Do the people of a sovereign nation have a right to rule themselve?
- Q. Do the people in a democracy have a right to rule themselves? A. Yes. Democracy means "people rule".

Racists Fight Apartheid

In South Africa, violence against black government officials, mayors, town councilors, and police has reached an all-time high. Black revolutionists sow fear in the black communities. They recently fired Soviet-made rockets at the city council in Soweto.

Our media claim these terrorists are fighting apartheid and social injustice. That is simply not true. Rev. Boesak, top leader in the fight against the white government, wrote: "Your government, wrote: "Your worst enemy is the man who makes you forget that you have an enemy. This is the white man who claims to be your friend. There are no good whites. The whites are not only your enemies; they are outside the people. It is laughable to love the enemy. Love exists only inside the people."

These are the teachings of the vice president of the South African Christian Council (Farewell to Innocence, p. 118), a man celebrated by Western church leaders who do not have the guidance of the Spirit.

The faithful bishop Mokoena, president of the In-dependent Reformed Black church, reports, "More than 1,000 of my black fellow men have been burned alive by the revolutionists, among whom many were necklaced. [A tire filled with gasoline is bound around the shoulders of the victim and then set afire.] Through acts of terror, they want to compel us blacks to take part in the revolution. Do they care about us? Do they protest when the bombs and mines of the African National Council kill or maim South Africans of all races?"

The South African government negotiates only with black murderers, not with peaceful blacks.

An especially dangerous situation developed in Namibia, where the terrorist organization SWAPO even now keeps some 1500 prisoners in camps, subjecting them to torture. Nujoma, chairman of SWAPO, publicly declared his solidarity with the murderer Ceaushescu of Romania.


