LIBERTARIANS CAN QUESTION CANDIDATES, TOO

For the past several years, the Local Issues Committee of the Santa Barbara Libertarian Party has sent questionnaires to candidates for various local, non-partisan offices. We concentrate our efforts on the races that are already generating the most enthusiasm and media attention.

We have made a commitment to a long-term project, recognizing that we will gain much-needed credibility if we make ourselves visible election after election.

We start by having one person collect articles from the local section of the paper, beginning about three months before the election. Everything that is an issue or looks like it might heat up into an issue gets clipped and filed.

We include an insert (one page, front and back) in our local newsletter to tell subscribers what we found out about the candidates. In 1984, we hope to do a special mailing of the newsletter with the insert to all registered Libertarians, if we can afford it. We also send out media releases and copies of the analysis to the candidates.

Our newsletter deadline sets our schedule: the results of the surveys have to be typed up in time to have the inserts printed. Working backward, we create a schedule:

A. Date the insert is due (typed, copied). Media releases are sent a few days later.

B. Time needed to write up the analysis. This depends on who will be doing the actual writing.

C. Time needed to analyse the responses. Plan on about two hours of work for each race. We analyse the responses by

assigning point scores to the possible multiple-choice answers and score them. Expect debate, if not acrimony, in the responses.

D. Time to follow up on candidates who don't return the surveys. Someone must be responsible for calling these people, and, if necessary, going to their houses to pick up the answers or even taking down the responses over the phone. Whatever it takes. Allow about a week for follow-up.

E. Date the answers are due back from the candidates.

F. Date the questionnaires are mailed. We send the survey with an explanatory "dear candidate" letter on our letterhead, and a self-addressed stamped envelope (S.A.S.E). Allow the candidates 7-10 days to respond. Expect phone calls from them.

G. Time to type, proofread, photocopy, stuff and mail. This depends on available people-power.

H. Date the questions must be written. This is the toughest part: the questions -- about 6 to 8 of them -- have to be timely, simple, have multiple-choice responses and the issue must have a realistic libertarian solution at the local level. Part of the goal is to educate the candidates. Allow at least 2 hours per race to prepare questions. This step will go more smoothly if the newspaper clipper has sorted articles into piles and trashed any of the obvious duds.

I. Figure out who will be involved in the project. We had a group of 5 one year. I'd suggest no fewer than 3, no more than 6. We have a permanent local issues committee--with candidate surveys as a major

task--but you could easily have an ad hoc group. Decide which races you'll be looking at; more than two or three and you'll have more work than you can handle.

I don't want to underestimate the amount of work that goes into this project, but I don't want to discourage anyone either. It's a lot of fun, a chance to really be a part of the local political scene, to get attention, and to cut past campaign rhetoric to issues that really matter to Libertarians.

STATE CONVENTION TO FEATURE
HISTORICAL TOPICS

Libertarian history will be the main bill of fare at the 1984 Convention of the Libertarian Party of California, "A Tribute to Our Libertarian Heritage," February 17-20, 1984, at the Sheraton-Universal Hotel in Universal City.

While delegates attend to convention business (hammering out platform changes, electing officers, and developing a long-range plan for the LPC), other convention attendees may hear various libertarian scholars and historians expound on over three centuries of libertarian history.

Although the historical topics will run concurrently with convention business, only one topic is scheduled for each time slot. This means that convention-goers will not be faced with the kinds of agonizing choices they have had to make between simultaneous program topics at past conventions.

Two panel discussions, one at the end of Saturday's session and the other at the end of Sunday's, will relate the historical topics covered to modern-day issues and concerns.

At meal functions, attended by delegates and non-delegates alike, tributes will be paid to five illustrious champions of liberty: John Locke (by John Hospers); Thomas Jefferson (by George Smith); Lysander Spooner (by Joe Fuhrig); Ludwig von Mises (by Murray Rothbard); and Ayn Rand (by Barbara Branden).

Evening activities on the program include:

-a debate between Fred Okrand of the ACLU and Manny Klausner on "Is There a Distinction Between Property Rights and Personal Liberties?"

-the World Premiere of the play "American Revolution"

-the Presidential Banquet, featuring Libertarian Presidential Candidate David Bergland.

As an inducement for new people to attend at least part of

the convention, there will be no charge for admission to the performance of Patrick Henry's famous "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death" speech, to be performed in full revolutionary costume by Marshall Bruce Evoy.

Package prices have been kept well below the prices of comparable packages at the 1983 (Oakland) and 1982 (Queen Mary) conventions. A special \$9 package (designed for students but available to anyone) admits the purchaser to four Saturday afternoon talks on early American history and the panel discussion which follows them. Other packages range in price from \$60 for a delegate's package with food to \$165 for a full package. Add \$20 to packages purchased after January 31.

The convention site is the glamorous Sheraton-Universal Hotel in Universal City, next door to the world-famous Universal Studios Tour and the Universal Amphitheatre, and only four miles from the Burbank Airport.

One hundred guest rooms, many with panoramic views of the San Fernando Valley, have been blocked for each night of the convention, February 17-19, at the very reasonable rate of \$58 per night, plus tax, for a single OR double room.

Some of the attractions within three miles of the Sheraton-Universal include the Hollywood Bowl, Mann's Chinese Theatre, and NBC Studios--home of the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. Although no side trips to nearby attractions have been scheduled during the convention, you may wish to arrive a day early or stay around after the convention to take in some sightseeing on your own.

Several marketing innovations, besides cutting prices, are being attempted with this convention. For example, each brochure contains a 33 1/3 RPM disc with a 6-minute recorded message promoting the convention. Secondly, the registration form allows registrants not only to pay their registration fee, but also to reserve their hotel room and plane ticket from the San Francisco Bay Area, all through the convention committee.

Finally, a multi-level marketing plan has been adopted whereby anyone who registers for the convention by January 31, 1984, can earn up to 20% commissions for each additional person he gets to register for the convention.

DELEGATE INFORMATION
COUNTY/REGION CHAIRS TAKE NOTE

Exact language from the bylaws covering delegate allocation was reprinted in last month's California Activist, but to summarize, your county/region will be allowed delegates to the 1984 convention as follows:

1. one delegate for each 1% of state membership in your county/region, PLUS
2. each holder of elective office who is registered to vote as a libertarian, and is a member of your county/region, PLUS
3. each county chair, PLUS
4. each member of the LPC Executive Committee.

However, if we don't have any official record of the existence of a county organization, county chair or county LPC executive committee reps on file in the office before the convention in February, we are going to have a hard time credentialing you at the convention. PLEASE MAKE IT EASY FOR US AND YOU: Make sure you have sent in the current information about county officers and exec comm reps to the San Jose office.

Below is a list of the chairs who have submitted the proper form with this information. If your county/region is not on this

DEAR LPC MEMBER:

It's that time again: time to renew your membership in the Libertarian Party of California. You will be receiving a renewal notice from the San Jose Headquarters office shortly. Please fill it out and return it promptly. Fast action on this item will help both you and the LPC in the following ways:

1. It will allow you to claim your 1984 membership as a tax credit on your 1983 federal tax return. That's a 50% tax credit, on up to \$100 per person, or \$200 per couple filing jointly; so, for example, your combined state and national membership (\$35 value) actually costs you only \$17.50. That also means that our government has \$17.50 less to spend on such worthwhile projects as a study of bi-sexual Polish frogs. Such a deal!

2. By renewing before December 31, 1983, when most memberships expire, you will help us avoid a paperwork log-jam. This will also save us time and money since we won't have to send second and third notices. So give our office coordinator, Karen Huffman, a break and renew early.

3. The National Libertarian Committee at its Dec. 3-5 meeting voted to increase the regular national dues to \$15, effective Jan. 1, 1984. So renew now for \$10 and avoid the increase till 1985.

4. By renewing early, you will allow the local and state organizations to better plan their 1984 activities, since they will have a more precise idea of how much money they will have to work with during 1984.

5. SPECIAL CONVENTION DEAL!! If your LPC renewal form is postmarked to the San Jose Office by January 5, 1984, your name will be included in a drawing to win a COMPLETE 1984 CONVENTION PACKAGE! This package is worth \$165 now, \$185 after January 31, 1984. Get your name in the hat for this valuable prize--renew your membership NOW. If you have already purchased a convention package, and you win this one, Convention Chair Bob Lehman has promised to refund your purchased package.

LPC CONTRIBUTORS: Your pledges and contributions during 1983 may have earned you credits on your

1984 membership fees. Your credit will be indicated on your renewal form; please complete the form and return it to us so we will know which county or regional organization is to receive the share of your membership dues normally sent to them. LPC members who are not yet pledging to the LPC: consider starting your 1984 pledge now to earn credits toward your 1985 membership fees. A pledge form can be found elsewhere in this issue. Return it today!

COUNTY/REGION CHAIRS TAKE NOTE: The LPC convention delegate count will be determined by the number of elected and dues paying members in your county/region AS OF DECEMBER 18, 1983. Those who wish to serve as delegates must be dues paying or elected members AT THE TIME THE DELEGATES ARE SELECTED BY YOUR LOCAL ORGANIZATION. So please make sure your representatives are current members of the LPC. This will reduce the hassles which occur every year, when delegates want to be credentialled at the 1984 convention.

LATE BREAKING NEWS: The National Committee of the Libertarian Party, at their December 3-5 meeting in New Orleans, authorized a dues increase for national membership. The regular annual dues of \$10 will be \$15 effective January 1, 1984. HINT: Renew now and avoid the increase till 1985. The LP also set a goal of 12,500 national members by the end of the 1984 election year. As a joint California and National member, you will help the Bergland/Lewis campaign by giving them a strong base on which to run the 1984 presidential race. Your national membership will help finance the national office in Houston, Texas; the many petition drives necessary to get the Bergland/Lewis ticket on the ballot in all 50 states; as well as the 9 scheduled issues of LP News. Although the money raised by membership dues in the national party account for only 10.5% of the total 1984 budget, it is important because these numbers are used to convince potential money givers of our stability, our growth, and our potential for the future. Advertising income for the LP News will also increase as their volume climbs. Your combined membership, when sent through the LPC, also helps us because 20% of

your national membership dues are retained by the LPC as a commission.

6. Editorial policy (i.e., who determines what will be printed)
7. Format and content--types of articles, monthly columns, permanent blocks of information, etc.
8. Printing and distribution arrangements
9. Costs and contract charges
10. Other pertinent information

Please send one copy of your proposal to each of the following committee members before February 1, 1984: Jack Dean (co-chair), Mary Gingell (co-chair), Les Antman, Ted Brown, Bill Evers, Eric Garris, Jeff Smith.
