Libertarians and guests, including state Chairman Bill Redpath, joined together at Arlington's Central Library to decide who should represent the Libertarian Party in the race to fill the House seat vacated by 12-term Democrat Jim Moran.

Under the coordination of the 8th District chair Laura Delhomme, a

unanimous vote gave Jeffery Carson the Libertarian nomination.

Jeffery is a professional product manager in the insurance industry with an MBA from Texas Tech. A look into his background reveals where much of his strength as a candidate arises. Jeffery is an Army veteran; he served his country and the Constitution. He understands that running as a Libertarian for Congress is an opportunity to continue to defend and uphold the founding values of this nation. Building on this, philosopher and author Ayn Rand served as "heroic" and "life changing" figure for Jeffery, especially her novel *The Fountainhead*, which he picked up out of curiosity in a used book store while stationed in the Mideast. Ron Paul is a contemporary political inspiration.

Jeffrey Carson sees his run for 8th District Representative as a "pursuit of truth." His campaign is coming together, and he is seeking donations and volunteers. He will be coordinating with Senate candidate Robert Sarvis' campaign to gather 1,000 signatures needed by early June to be on the ballot. Repeal the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act

To bring about a freer society, we must not only oppose pending legislation that would further infringe liberty, but also repeal existing anti-libertarian statutes. One such law is the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) of 1998.

COPPA requires operators of websites and other online services to obtain verifiable parental consent before collecting personal information from persons under age 13.

Personal information includes first and last names; online or offline contact information (including physical addresses and screen names); and photographs, videos and audio files, among other things.

A consequence of this law is that many social networking sites such as Facebook have banned people under age 13 from using them. As with many other statist prohibitions, this merely forces the activity underground. A study conducted in 2011 found that 19 percent of the parents of 10-year-olds, 32 percent of the parents of 11-year-olds, and 55 percent of the parents of 12-year-olds acknowledged that their children were using Facebook. 68 percent of the parents of underage Facebook users indicated that they helped their child create the account by entering a false date of birth. Thus, COPPA has created a

situation in which millions of children are being taught that they will need to lie to adults in order to get around the restrictions the government has imposed upon them. The use of the honor system with respect to age requirements makes this law mostly ineffective (if not counterproductive) at protecting kids. But requiring websites to verify users' ages by making them identify themselves by, e.g., making a credit card purchase, would threaten free speech by curtailing anonymity and making sign-up processes for online communication services more expensive and cumbersome. There is no way for libertarians to win with this useless law.

COPPA also limits children's opportunities to learn and socialize outside of government-sponsored and -supervised venues. A perennial criticism of home schooling is that students supposedly lose the chance to interact with a larger group of teachers and peers. However, a great advantage of the Internet over government schools is that one is not limited to the people and educational facilities of one's school district; one can connect with friends and colleagues from all over the world. Technology enables kids to block communications from bullies or withdraw from classes where the teaching quality is poor. But COPPA's onerous restrictions destroy entrepreneurs' incentives to develop sites designed to serve children's needs.

The Irrelevancy of CHPs

The recent controversy concerning Governor McAuliffe and his attempt to alter the wording on the HB 962 Bill, making it illegal for a Virginia resident without a concealed handgun permit (CHP) to transport a firearm in their own personal vehicle without storing said weapon in a “locked container”, got me thinking about concealed carry and the broader implications those laws have for Virginians.

I am a gun owner, and a CHP holder. My trusty .357 magnum accompanies me wherever the law allows. Yet, as a libertarian, I know the state’s requirement of a CHP to legally conceal a weapon is Constitutionally invalid and even discriminatory. Concealed carry laws accomplish nothing, save for inconveniencing law abiding citizens. After all, criminals do not seek the court’s permission to hide their weapons.

CHPs, as currently issued, force citizens to submit to a long bureaucratic process of background checks and paperwork to fully exercise their Constitutionally guaranteed right to bear arms. This system also carries with it a rather hefty fee, payable to the circuit court, of about \$60.00. For poorer Virginians, such a sum of money may be wholly unaffordable. Thus, by levying what is essentially a onetime tax, the State of Virginia bars citizens of lesser means from fully exercising their right to carry a weapon for purposes self defense.

For the State, however, the issuance of permits represents a very tidy profit, while providing little to no benefit for the public.

CHPs do not deter gun crime, how could they? What armed robber or mass murderer is going to apply for a CHP before they go commit their foul deed?

CHPs do not make it easier for police to identify law abiding citizens during traffic stops or searches. In the event of a stop, it is already standard police procedure to run a suspect’s credentials through various databases to ensure they do not have any outstanding warrants. Such a query would reveal the legal status of a person in possession of a firearm, allowing police to determine if said person was legally able to carry a weapon, essentially rendering a CHP redundant.

The only true purpose of CHPs is, essentially, to act as a bill of sale. CHPs represent a ransom paid by citizens to the state in exchange for the privilege of exercising their Constitutional right to bear arms more fully. I for one find this unacceptable.

The Party with a Pulse?

Is that all we are? Will we run any candidate, for any office, if he or she can fog a mirror? Does running any candidate we can find, anywhere we can, advance our cause? Or does a series of humiliating defeats do us more harm than good?

There are three reasons to run a Libertarian candidate in a partisan election: to win, to get the Libertarian Party message out into the marketplace of ideas, and to make it easier for some future Libertarian to win.

So far, we have not done so well in the first goal, for a number of reasons. But certainly, when we have a quality candidate and there is a reasonable chance our candidate can win, we should try.

But it does us good to get our ideas out into the public, right? Well, if we were all persuasive

and articulate spokesmen for the party, that would be true. But we are not all Jim Lark or Harry Browne. On the contrary, we have run candidates recruited by out-of-state PACS with dubious motives who were not even Libertarian Party members at the time they were recruited to run. Our ideas are based on reason and history and are difficult to extol if the candidate himself lacks the basic understanding of economics and ethics from which our principles derive.

Well, what is the harm then? First, these candidates with the fire-in-the-belly to run are not an endless resource. Putting them before the public and a skeptical press before they are ready makes them little more than cannon fodder. They will never try again.

But maybe the next guy will do better because we tried? Perhaps, but it depends on how badly we lose. If a Statewide candidate can get 10% of the vote, we get recognition as a party for the next election cycle. If a candidate can poll 10%, we get into the debates, and Libertarians do not lose debates. So yes, double digit results

certainly make it road easier for the next guy. But what about the more common 1-4% finishes?

Those are killing our party. Every one of them sets us back and drives serious lovers of Liberty out of our party. Time and time again, we have seen our membership contract after a lopsided loss as our best and most ambitious members become convinced the Libertarian Party is a dead end. They often decide they can advance Liberty better by pursuing the hopeless goal of reforming the Republican Party. We do not just lose members, we lose our most passionate members; those who see a future for themselves as office holders. Disheartened by poor election numbers, these members see running as a Libertarian as a lost cause.

Every 1-4% showing results in our future leaders walking away. We cannot afford the loss of talent. We can sit back in our cloisters and damn those of little faith as unworthy of the Libertarian Party, but how does that help us win the next time?

So we cannot be the party of any candidate with a pulse, or we will shortly be the party with no


pulse. We need to pick our battles more carefully. Getting between two well financed major party candidates results in the fear of splitting the vote kicking in and we are on the way to 1% before the campaign starts. But 45 of 100 General Assembly candidates ran unopposed. Those are our targets of opportunity. We can always find at least 10% there who just will not vote for the incumbent and who will be open to hearing what a Libertarian candidate has to offer. Even then, we can only challenge an incumbent when we have a good candidate in the district who can represent us well.

We must bide our time and wait for those opportunities where a vulnerable, but unopposed, incumbent can be challenged by an articulate and well prepared Libertarian.

Those are the races which advance our Party and Liberty.

VIRGINIA MEMBERSHIP

I want to be counted as a member of the Virginia affiliate of the Libertarian Party.

ELIGIBILITY: Any person who is currently and has been a member of the national Libertarian Party, who resides and is domiciled in Virginia (as defined by Virginia law) and who has donated at least \$25 (Targeted or Project donations excepted) (or at least \$5 if a current student) to the Libertarian Party of Virginia within the preceding twelve month period, is a member of the Libertarian Party of Virginia.

U.S. citizens who, due to military service, do not reside in Virginia but are registered Virginia voters, or U.S. citizens living overseas who can prove Virginia citizenship, shall be eligible to become members of the LPVA under the same terms as above.

Any resident of Virginia who is a Life Member of the national LP shall be considered a member of the LPVA.

MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS PRIVILEGES

VIRGINIA: By donating at least \$25 to the Virginia LP, members are able to vote at LPVA conventions, seek a seat on Virginia's delegation to the national convention, and hold internal LPVA offices.

NATIONAL: Basic national membership is free, but by donating \$25 or more, you will be considered a "Sustaining" member and will be 1) counted towards Virginia's national delegate apportionment and 2) eligible to hold National Committee office.

Contributors donating at least \$50 using this form will automatically receive **LPNews**, the national Party newspaper, and **Virginia Liberty** from LPVA.

By using this form, you confirm that the following statements are true and accurate:

- * I am a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien.
- * This contribution is not made from the general treasury funds of a corporation, labor organization or national bank.
- * This contribution is not made from the treasury of an entity or person who is a federal contractor.
- * The funds I am donating are not being provided to me by another person or entity for the purpose of making this contribution.
