FROM THE CHAIR

The year is off to a good start.

With the exception of one hotly debated topic, the State Executive Committee meeting in Tahoe on Sunday, May 6, went very smoothly. And this can be directly attributed to the Saturday committee meetings which continue to make the Sunday general sessions work more efficient.

Both the Budget Committee and the Contract Services Management Committee (CSMC) met in joint session for nearly seven hours on Saturday, and had met for approximately the same amount of time on the previous Saturday at my home in Orange County. By my rough estimate, a total of nearly 300 hours--in person and by phone--went into the budget and contract discussions for the coming year. That's dedication!

My sincere thanks to members of both committees who cared enough to put so much thought, time and energy into those areas that will be crucial to the LP during the coming year: the Budget Committee is chaired by state treasurer Steve Alexander, and members are Sam Treynor, Dennis Schlumpf, and Ray Cullen; the Contract Services Management Committee is chaired by Carolyn Treynor and consists of Steve Alexander, Jerry Douglas, and Mary Gingell.

As chair, I served as a member of both committees, so I know how hard everyone worked. I sincerely hope that the other committees I'm appointing this year will be as dedicated.

The 1984 budget of \$72,000 which was passed by the state committee is energetic but realistic based on the past year's revenues. However, it does assume modest growth in both membership and pledges.

Which brings me to the most important part of my column this month. Last year, the executive director position was a separate "project" and as such was completely separate from the LPC's operating budget.

This year--at my insistence, and with the concurrence of the joint committee--the executive director's compensation will be included in the Party's budget, and it will be based on a percentage of funds raised from ALL sources. (It will account for approximately two-thirds of the entire budget.)

This means that ALL of us now have a vested interest in increasing membership and contributions: the executive director will have an incentive to assist the Party in every funding project because they will all directly affect his income; and likewise, if the membership desires to see Party programs carried out as well as the continuance of the executive director program, members will do all they can to help him in his efforts. And together, both the Party and the executive director will share proportionally in the good months as well as the bad.

To me, this is a far fairer approach than having the executive director "sink or swim" on his own.

The one "hotly debated topic" I mentioned at the beginning of this column was the executive director's new contract and compensation package. The negotiations between Marshall Fritz and the CSMC/Budget Committee had reached an impasse on Saturday evening, and it seemed that the executive committee as a whole was headed for a similar outcome on Sunday...which is why I asked the body to allow me to continue negotiations with Marshall on a one-to one basis.

I feel it is important that the LPC maintain a full-time executive director if we are to sustain our momentum. And to those of you who have asked how you can help to insure that we do, all I can say is this: If you haven't yet made a monthly pledge to the LPC, do so...and if you have, then ask at least one other person to do so. To put it simply, the only way we can make our program for the coming year work is to pitch in and do our share to make the finances happen.

BERGLAND FOR PRESIDENT
CALIFORNIA NEWS

One by one, county LP organizations and local candidates are discovering ways that the Presidential campaign can help them.

In Los Angeles Region 63, the Bergland campaign is being merged into Mike Yauch's Congressional campaign to increase active participation in both. The same path will likely be followed in Marin County, where Howard Creighton's Congressional campaign is the main focus of local activity, and in San Diego County with the Congressional campaign of Sara Baase. In Santa Clara County a campaign management team directs the efforts for a slate of ten candidates, including Bergland. In Butte, Shasta and Tehama Counties, State Senate candidate Robert Murphy will distribute Bergland literature along with his own wherever he campaigns.

Other counties are choosing to make the Bergland campaign their primary effort, without benefit of local candidates. Lake County Libertarians are planning to construct 4-foot by 8-foot highway signs in strategic locations. In Contra Costa County a team of very enthusiastic newly-registered voters is running the campaign and coming up with innovative ideas for using the Bergland campaign to build the local Party.

Libertarians in Los Angeles, Kern, Fresno, Monterey, Santa Cruz and Santa Clara Counties are making plans for Bergland's trip through California July 8-13, the week before the Democratic National Convention in San Francisco. Fundraisers are being arranged in Beverly Hills, San Marino, Newport Beach, Fresno, and San Jose during this period.

The July visit will be Bergland's last major tour of California until late October, although he will be returning to the state for a couple of weekends in August and September. Next month's California Activist will carry the itinerary for Bergland's July visit in more detail.

CATO SUMMER SEMINAR

The Cato Institute will hold its 7th Annual Summer Seminar in Political Economy at Dartmouth College in Hanover, New Hampshire, June 30 through July 7, 1984.

Seminar speakers will include Henri Lepage, James Sadowsky, Israel Kirzner, George Smith, Roy Childs, Earl Ravenal, Ralph Raico, John Gray, Leonard Liggio, David Boaz, and Don Lavoie. Topics covered during the 27 lectures and discussions will include economics, ethics, history, foreign policy, and domestic issues.

Applications for the seminar will be accepted until June 4, 1984. The cost of the program is \$450 for non-students or \$125 for students, including room and board, two banquets, a picnic, reading materials, and all lectures. Some scholarships are available.

More than 1000 people have attended Cato summer seminars over the past six years. They have proven to be extremely popular with libertarians.

BALLOT PROPOSITION POSITIONS

GINGELL TO CONTINUE AS EDITOR

At its May 6 executive committee meeting, the state Libertarian Party voted to ask Mary Gingell, editor of the California Activist since 1982, to continue in that role.

Gingell, who is vice chair of the National LP and administrative assistant in the national Bergland for President headquarters, told a staff reporter for the Activist that of all her many Libertarian activities the thing she "enjoys the most" is the 30 hours a month she spends editing the Activist. "I love every part of it: writing, editing, and especially --believe it or not-- paste-up," said Gingell as she enthusiastically waved ink-stained fingers during production of this issue.

In recent months, Gingell has added a statewide calendar of events and more news to the Activist's core material on political and campaign techniques. Gingell told the Activist that possible future innovations may include book reviews and profiles of LP activists.

Gingell also says that readers should expect some changes in appearance in months ahead. "We plan to phase in a change to professional typesetting," Gingell says. Some sections of the newsletter, such as the calendar, may remain in typewriter-style to facilitate last minute changes of information. The publication's current format is six to eight pages of typewriter-style type, set on a word-processing computer.

Gingell also plans to explore adding an advertising manager and a news editor to the newsletter's management. Persons holding these positions would systematize solicitation of advertising and gathering of local news.

Currently, mailing and circulation is done by a team of Santa Clara County volunteers under the supervision of San Jose office coordinator Karen Huffman. Jeff Smith handles the details of business relations with the Postal Service. Alameda County volunteers Mark Ross and Michael Tejada do the actual printing of the Activist.

At its May 6 Executive Committee meeting, the Libertarian Party of California made the following recommendations for voting on the June 5 ballot propositions (summary of the proposition courtesy of California Journal magazine; remember that ballot propositions are now being numbered sequentially from ballot to ballot, rather than starting with number one):

16. COUNTY JAIL EXPENDITURE BOND ACT OF 1984. This measure would provide for the issuance of \$250 million for construction of county jail facilities. Recommendation: NO

17. NEW PRISON CONSTRUCTION BOND ACT OF 1984. This proposal would provide for the issuance of \$300 million for the construction of state prison facilities. Recommendation: NO

18. CALIFORNIA PARK AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES ACT OF 1984. This measure would provide for the issuance of \$370 million for state and local parks, coastal resource areas and wildlife management areas. Recommendation: NO

19. FISH AND WILDLIFE HABITAT ENHANCEMENT ACT OF 1984. This proposal would provide for the issuance of \$85 million for fish and wildlife habitats. Recommendation: NO

20. CAMPAIGN LIBEL LAW. This measure would remove from office any elected official later convicted of libeling or slandering an opponent during an election. Recommendation: NO (see argument against this proposition authored by Libertarian Presidential candidate David Bergland, and Libertarian activists Eric Garris and Joe Fuhrig, in your voter's handbook.)

21. INVESTMENTS BY PUBLIC PENSION SYSTEMS. This measure converts public pension assets into trust funds and removes constitutional restrictions on the purchase of corporate stock by those funds. NO RECOMMENDATION

22. CIVIL SERVICE EXEMPT POSITIONS. This measure exempts from civil service status certain management positions in the state's largest retirement systems. NO RECOMMENDATION

23. PROPERTY TAX ON NEW CONSTRUCTION. This proposed constitutional amendment would exempt from property tax assessment as new construction those buildings upgraded to comply with local seismic safety ordinances. Recommendation: YES

24. RULES OF THE LEGISLATURE. This measure changes rules that operate the Legislature and limits the amount the Legislature can spend on itself. Recommendation: YES (with reservations)

The state LP's previous publication, Caliber, ceased publication in the fall of 1983 after 11 years.

BOYCOTT THE VOTING BOOTH!

I'm not suggesting that you abstain from voting. What I am suggesting is that you consider voting by mail using the absentee ballot.

A major revolution has quietly swept into the voting procedures of California. In recent years it has become quite acceptable to choose to vote by mail. No excuse is necessary. Yet most people still march down to the polls and endure varying degrees of inconvenience to cast their ballots. Or else they choose not to vote at all.

Try the mail ballot procedure--it's ridiculously

easy. In the back of your voting booklet is a post card for requesting a mail ballot. Sign the card as you are registered. That's it!

Your ballot will arrive by mail. You fill out the ballot at home anytime before the election and mail back in the enclosed envelope. No witnessing of signatures is required. About the only caveat is that you must request the ballot at least a week before the election.

Frankly, I think that voting should not be so convenient; studies indicate that easy voting procedures increase the statist vote. Nevertheless I recommend that you consider the absentee voting option this year, and enjoy your extra free time!
